#### Complex Ores Yield To New Treatment

One of the greatest of Arizona's problems has been the economical separation of complex ores. Many mines have been found in which copper is the chief constituent but had impurities present, such as zinc, tungsten, molybdenum, vanadium, chromium and antimony; in such cases the sellers have not been nel on that property. paid for the values in these metals, but were actually penalized.

It will be of much interest to the owners of properties containing complex ores to learn that a new process has been discovered and a plant now being erected in Los Angeles which will allow payment for practically all of the values in an ore, and which will take ore with lower percentages of metals than have heretofore been accepted. Heretofore, molybdenum had to be concentrated to a large percentage, and if copper was present, the molybdenite was not as readily sold. But according slope of the Santa Ritas, in the Tyndall to the reports of the promotors of this new process, low grade molybdenum ores may be handled and the copper also paid for. The same applies to zinc and very particularly to vanadium, which is seldom salable on account of its impurities of other metals.

The new process does not penalize for sulphur, arsenic, silicate barytes or bismuth. It is claimed that the complex lead-copper-zinc-antimony silver ores from Inyo and Mono counties, California, and the complex tin sulphides from Bolivia, which have heretofore been only valuable for the copper contained, have been successfully treated. Ores from Bolivia containing tin, tungsten, zinc, lead, and antimony are received, for all of which metals payment is made.

Messages by Searchlight. Although searchlight signaling between battleships was a means of communication at sea long before the introduction of wireless telegraphy, it is still utilized. The latest battleships of our navy, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, have been equipped with projectors designed especially for this purpose, while the older vessels use their regular searchlights for which auxiliary shutters are supplied. Levers operate these latter members, flashing the lights on and off quickly so that messages may be spelled out in dots and dashes, either at day or night. For day signaling, the light shaft is directed squarely at the observer, and to make this possible a telescope is mounted with the projector. When atmospheric conditions are good the radius of communication is about twelve miles in any direction. At night this is obviously much increased, for light may be played on some prominent cloud and seen for a distance of forty or fifty miles. When there are no clouds, the searchlights may be directed skyward and their shafts of light seen at closer range. The feasibility of launching captive balloons as substitutes for cloud banks has been uggested,





The struggle of life among the birds and other wild creatures is so severe that the feeble and malformed, or the handicapped in any way, quickly drop out, writes John Burroughs in Harper's Magazine. Probably none of them ever die from old age. They are cut off in their prime. A weeding out process goes on from the time they leave the nest. A full measure of life, the perfection of every quill and feather, and unerring instinct, carry them along. They are always in the enemy's country; they are always on the firing line; eternal vigilance and ceaseless activity are the price of life with them. The natural length of life of our smaller birds is calculated to be eight or ten years, but probably not one in a thousand reaches that age. Not half a dozen times in my life have I found the body of a dead bird that did not show some marks of violence.


