HOLY GRAIL MERELY LEGEND

Green Crystal Vase Found by Baldwin I in Ruins of Cesarea is Only So Called.

Few places are more absolutely cities of the past than Cesarea. Some one has spoken of the remains of its ancient glory as the "ruin of ruins." The medieval town which was twice rebuilt by the Crusaders covered scarcely a tenth of the area occupied by the city as St. Paul knew it, and the ruins that we see today are chiefly the relics of the medieval city, which was itself built out of the ruins of

the ancient city. What a rich quarry Cesarea has been for other city builders is shown by the fact that, though it has been drawn upon for all these centuries for marble and granite and sandstone, it is not yet absolutely exhausted, but still affords building material for the peasants of the vicinity.

The green crystal vase which was found here when Baldwin I, the great Crusader, captured the city at the beginning of the twelfth century, says the Christian Herald, gave rise to the story of the Holy Grail, which has inspired so many legends and poems, for Baldwin and his followers believed that it was the one that was used at the Last Supper by our Lord, when he gave his disciples the cup of wine and said: "Drink ye all of it; this do in remembrance of me."

WOOL IN PLACE OF COTTON

Comforts Filled With the Former Material Are Much Lighter Than Those Generally in Use.

For the last year or two the shops have shown an article of bedding which, though in use in many farm homes, had not been familiar on the counters. This is the wool-filled comfort, that is destined to take the place of the cotton-wadded comforters. Now however, as well as the completed comforts, there are to be had in many shops sheets of carded wool with which to make up these comforts at home, covering them with silk, satin, or patchwork.

The sheet wadding comes in three weights, all having the same dimensions-72 by 84 inches. The lightest contains one pound of wool. It is designed as filling for a crib quilt and to be folded over into half size. The next heavier weighs two pounds, while the heaviest weighs three pounds. Ready made wool comforts can be bought at various prices, from about \$4 according to the thickness of the wool and the quality of the covering.

Many housekeepers now prefer wool-filled comforts to those filled with down, since the wool-filled comforts never "shed" as down puffs will after usage. They are especially desirable for children and for elderly persons, since they are warm but not heavy. A three-pound wool comfort weighs about half as much as a full sized woollen blanket.

Sateen makes an excellent covering for wool comforts. A flowered center, bordered with a plain color, is especially attractive. It can be knotted with silk or quilted in any fancied

KEEPS WHIPPED CREAM FIRM

Method That Will Do Away With a Great Deal of the Trouble That Sometimes Bothers Cooks.

Heavy whipped cream, if allowed to stand, is apt to become watery and thin at the bottom of the bowl, the sugar having the tendency to separate in the form of a weak sirup. This, is especially true if the cream was not very heavy before being whipped. To remedy this, to every pint of whipped cream soak a scant tablespoonful of granulated gelatin in enough cold water to barely cover it, until it is soft. Then add a small half teacupful of bolling water and stir until the gelatin-is completely dissolved, after which add three-quarters of a cup of sugar and whatever flavoring you intend to use for the cream. Turn this into a cold bowl and beat with an eggbeater until it is white like marshmallows and begins to become firm, and just as soon as it has reached this point, but before it has commenced to grow stringy, beat it by spoonfuls into the cream, which has already been beaten

This will increase the bulk of the sweeten and flavor it, but will keep it of the whipped cream desired.

New Way to Serve Steak Perhaps you have grown tired of he usual way steak is served. If so, try this. Buy a good thick one, either sirloin or porterhouse. Season slightly with pepper and salt, and broil until it is moderately brown. Have prepared enough chopped parsley and white onion to cover it. Dot it thickly with dabs of butter and bake in a quick oven for five minutes. The onion, parsley and butten sink into the meat, the parsley absorbing the strong flavor of the onion. Once a steak is served in this manner, the

Baked Beef Roll.

Take one pint of finely chopped cold roast beef and add one-half cupful of fine bread crumbs and two beaten eggs, one tablespoonful of melted butter, one-half teaspoonful of onion juice, one scant teaspoonful of mixed parsley, a grating of nutmeg and a dash of white speeches, none of which rang really pepper. Mix thoroughly, shape in a half an hour, basting frequently with melted butter and hot water. Serve hot with brown or tomato sauce or slice cold as desired.

Chicken and Mushrooms.

A delicate dish for a dainty lunch or a meal for an invalid is a combination of chicken and mushrooms pre pared in a casserole. The mushrooms are fried in butter very lightly, then a tablespoonful of flour mixed with a scant cupful of milk is poured in and cooked until creamy. The mushrooms and cold chicken are packed into the casserole in alternate layers and the creamy sauce poured over. The dish is set in the oven until the contents are heated through evenly.

Creole Corn.

Butter a baking dish and cover the bottom with a layer of fine bread crumbs. Then add a layer of canned corn, seasoning with butter, pepper and salt, and dotting over with bits of canned pimento. Cover with crumbs, then repeat till corn is all used. The top layer should be of crumbs. Dot the top with butter, and fill the dish with milk. Bake 45 minutes.

Mashed Potatoes. Mashed potatoes will be fluffy if onehalf teaspoonful of baking powder is added to the milk put into them.

Artificial Limbs Brought to State of Perfection.

Ingenious Construction of Arm Enables Wearer to Perform Almost All the Tasks Possible to the Normal Man.


To those unfortunates who have been deprived of their hands and arms through accident or otherwise, it would appear that aid in the form of artificial limbs is about to be realized. At least, the artificial limbs invented by an American who, some twelve years ago, tost his arra while operating a milling machine in a Pittsburgh shop and devised the improved artificial limb during his convalescence-emulate the natural ones to such a striking degree that the handicap heretofore suffered by cripples is materially reduced.

An artifical arm was recently exhibited at the International Surgical congress held in New York, and the dexto perform different tasks was little short of a revelation. The artificial limb permits of the performance of all ordinary tasks, including the drinking of a glass of gater, buttoning of shoes, tipping one's hat and, as an extreme example of its practicality, the carrying a satchel weighing about 30 pounds.

In the artificial arm, fiber willow is used for the wooden portion, while steel gears take the place of joints and rawhide cords act as muscles. Each rawhide cord ends on a pair of suspenders fastened across the back and the chest, which furnishes the necessary tension. Thus the shrugging of the shoulder is made to control the arm and hand and the 240 parts of which they are composed. The rawhide muscles move the steel joints, and the unison that obtains makes the action of the arm almost natural. The elbow is bent with a simple forward movement of the stump which, by means of the cord attached from the forearm to the shoulder suspender, raises the hand as high as the wearer wishes-high enough to take off his hat or brush his hair, if so desired.

A downward movement of the shoulder causes a slight tension on another rawhide cord controlling the fingers, which results in bending the hand backward from the wrist joint and the opening of the fingers, Another shrug of the shoulder closes the fingers and locks them so that they tightly grip the object that is being handled, from a toothpick to a valise. Repeating the downward movement of the shoulder causes the fingers to be unlocked. The wrist is provided with a hinge joint and a button and can be locked securely in three positions. If desired, the button can be pushed back and the wrist flexed automatically by means of the cord which opens and closes the fingers. All the work is done by the shoulders. Raising the elbow moves the wrist one-third of a turn.

The accompanying line drawings depict the more important features of



the artificial limbs. At A and B are shown the back and front views, respectively, of the shoulder harness or straps and how they are worn. 


