## Geo. H. Francis for Treasurer; Mrs. Geo. Marsh for Legislature

There has been so many soldiers in Nogales, and more coming every day, that talk has been mostly of a military nature, overlooking the fact that the primaries are but six weeks away. This week, however, some political talk has been heard, but it will probably be a couple of weeks yet before the tickets have been completed for the primary and the ball started rolling in real earnest.

In the hotel lobbies and streets of the county seat, one hears the name of Geo. H. Francis being spoken of as the possible candidate for the nomination on the Democratic ticket for treasurer. Patagonia's postmaster is well qualified for the position, and while he has not yet signified his intention of making the race, considerable pressure is being brought to bear by Democrats both at Nogales and Patagonia to get him to run. It is contended that Patagonia is entitled to a little place in the political sun, and there is no better Democrat or more qualified man than Francis in the district.

Another piece of political news from the busy county seat, is that there is considerable talk among Democratic party leaders to try to persuade Mrs. Theodora Marsh to make the race for the nomination on that ticket for state representative. Mrs. Marsh is quite well known throughout the county and in Nogales. She is public spirited and has been identified with most of the big enterprises of this county, both in a business way and as a matter of public concern. While Mrs. Marsh has not yet consented to enter politics, and probably doesn't know that she is being talked of as a possible candidate, her ability is unquestioned and she could do as much good as any other representative the county could send; also the idea of Santa Cruz being represented in the lower house of the legislature by a talented woman, as remarked by a man in the lobby of the Montezuma the other evening, seems "rather classy."

Other candidates who have thrown their lids into the political arena are: Raymond Earhart, who seeks the Democratic nomination for sheriff; Aerus Reddock, who wants to succeed himself as county recorder; Vic Wager, who wants another term as assessor; Chas. Hardy Jr., wishes the nomination on the Democratic ticket for county attorney; A. H. de Reimer wants the same honor from the Republicans; Geo. H. Fiedler has announced for another term as supervisor on the Democratic ticket, and Mr. McKnight, the Republican, wishes to succeed himself as sheriff.

There seems to be some doubt in the minds of some of those who are seeking office in this county as to the correct method of procedure to get their names on the official ballot, and the following, which is believed to be correct, is given for their information:

To become a candidate for a state, county or precinct office the person must first file a written declaration of intention with the secretary of state, if a candidate for state office, or with the clerk of the board of supervisors, if a candidate for county or precinct office.

Then the candidate must have a regular nomination paper, in the form of a

petition, drawn up and circulated for signatures, the number of names necessary depending on the office he seeks. Candidates for state officers, excepting members of the legislature and superior court judges, must secure signatures equal to one per cent of the total number of votes cast for the gubernatorial candidate in at least three counties in the state at the preceding election. If a candidate for a county office, member of the legislature or superior judge, he must secure the signatures of not less than three per cent nor more than ten per cent of the total vote of the party designated in such county.

Nomination petitions for all county offices must be filed with the clerk of the board of supervisors, not more than sixty nor less than twenty days before the 12th day of September, 1916. At the same time there must be filed the name of each any individual, with his post office address, by or through whom such candidates have expended or propose to expend money in defraying the expenses of their campaign. Should any candidate determine not to authorize or appoint any such person or persons, he shall notify such officer that he has not authorized and will not authorize any person to act for him, but that he will, in person, account for all money or other thing of value expended in the interest of his candidacy. Said account must be filed within ten days after the primary election. Should the candidate fail to file this account, or the preliminary statement, his name may not appear on the official ballot.

H. E. Lawrence is now superintendent at the Andes mine on Red Mountain.

An option has been given on the Dixie this week. A deal is on for the purchase of this property by eastern parties.

Secretary Lane has announced that a new mining experiment station will be located at Tucson and a safety station at Raton, N. M.

Charley Jones, the Bisbee operator, was in Patagonia this week, looking over different mining properties here in which he is interested.

Six or seven new freight teams have been added to the Duquesne haul this week, and a large increase in tonnage is being shipped from that mine.

The tunnel on the property of O. F. Ashburn, in the Three R vicinity, is said to be getting into some fine looking rock. This tunnel is in about 300 feet.

James P. Harvey, a mining man of Spokane, said to be a representative of "Patav" Clark, has been in the district this week, examining the Bland mine in the Alto country.

Poor and almost forgotten, Phillip Deidensheimer, 84 years old, a mining engineer once world famous, died in San Francisco last week. He invented, but never patented, the "square set," a system of underground timbering, now used all over the world.

There is considerable talk heard lately of the starting up of the old smelter at Benson. A representative of the American Smelting & Refining company was in Patagonia this week, and he said the smelter would again be worked within the very near future, and advised shippers from this district to send their ore there. It would be a considerable saving in freight.

The crosscut at the Hardtmayer mine, a few miles out of town, is in good ore, according to reports. The crosscut is making for a big copper ledge, and will be continued several hundred feet. The Hardtmayer was formerly known as the old Bland mine, in which Jack Cudahy of Kansas City was at one time interested. It is now being worked by Pete Hanson, W. T. Strickland and Dr. Hardtmayer.

Elmer Parker had a rather exciting experience one day last week, while driving a caterpillar on the Duquesne ore haul. He was backing down a hill after a trailer, when the brake broke, letting the big machine go over the grade. Elmer "got from under" in time to escape injury, and the caterpillar was not demolished as much as would be supposed. It went over the grade and fell about 40 feet, but landed right side up.
