### FIGHTING THE WHITE PLAGUE

Discovery of Tuberculosis Germ by Doctor Koch 32 Years Ago Inaugurated a Campaign.

The germ of tuberculosis was discovered 32 years ago by Dr. Robert Koch of Germany, who spent two years in laboratory work in search of it. The discovery changed the whole world's attitude toward tuberculosis.

Since the days of the ancient Assyrians the destroying germ has ravaged humanity, and in all the successive generations at least every sixth human being was at some time affected by its presence in the blood. Less than half a century ago the disease was regarded as "fatal and hopeless." Some people looked on it as a divine affliction of the human race, and an indication of mankind's degeneration. Thirty years ago Europe was reporting 1,000,000 deaths every year from tuberculosis and the United States was reporting at the rate of 450 every

Today the civilized nations of the world are conducting a general war against the tubercle bacillus. In the United States more than \$20,000,000 is being expended annually for this purpose. The death rate in 20 years has fallen from a ratio of 245.4 to 158 to the 100,000.

Physicians have long known that the bacilli lurk in everyone's system waiting for the vitality to sink to a low ebb when they can begin their fearful scourge. Consequently, the universal campaign is to make everyone strong enough to resist the destroyers. The world has thrown open its windows to let in sunlight and fresh air, knowing that these are fatal to the bacilli. The old fear of "night air" has given way to the practice of living, sleeping and working out of doors where the bacilli cannot follow and live.

### SWIMMING MACHINE IS ODD

Propeller Drives Wearer of Device Forward While Preserver-Floats Him-Arms Do the Work,

Now we have a swimming machine among the things that have made so many arts and sciences mechanical. This machine was invented by a New York genius, and all that the owner has to do is to strap it on and turn the crank. He is then propelled rapidly through the water while in an upright position and has his feet free to kick the fishes out of the way. A broad life preserver is strapped around the body under the armpits. Running back from this is a tube with a driving shaft inside it and a screw propel-

ler at the rear end. Running forward is an extension of the tube with the gear wheel that operates the shaft and handles for driving it. The "swimmer," or whatever he may be called, has merely to turn the handles and the propeller is started revolving. pushing him through the water at a rapid rate. If he wants to go straight forward he need not use his feet at all, but in order to change his course he has only to kick out a few times with the foot opposite the direction in which he wishes to go.

Suggested Use for Aeroplane.

A novel use for the aeroplane is under consideration by owners of sealing vessels as a result of the failure of the seal hunt this year. It is proposed that two experienced aviators be engaged to visit the east coast and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, respectively, just before the opening of next season and find the herds. The information thus obtained would enable the fleet to sail directly for the scene of the hunt instead of spending much time searching for the animals.

RECIPES THAT HAVE BEEN TRIED AND NOT FOUND WANTING.

Fine Served With a Form of Mincemeat-Mixed With Raisins-Two Kinds of Rhubarb Meringue Are Recommended.

Mince Rhubarb Pie.-One cupful of rhubarb, after chopping fine, one-half cupful sugar, one-half cupful best moasses, one-half cupful water, one-half cupful raisins chopped, one and a haif crackers, rolled, one egg, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon, one-fourth teaspoonful cloves, a little nutmeg, a little salt and one tablespoonful butter. Bake with two crusts. This makes two pies.

Mock Lemon Pie .- One cupful rhubarb sauce, three-fourths cupful sugar, yolks of two eggs, two tablespoonfuls of sweet cream. Flavor with lemon extract, bake in one crust and frost with whites of two eggs and two table spoonfuls of sugar.

Rhubarb and Raisin Pie.-Two cupfuls of rhubarb and one cupful of raisins, chopped together quite fine, one cupful sugar, one teaspoonful cinnamon, a little salt and bits of butter. Bake in two crusts.

Delicious Rhubarb Pie.-Line a deep ple plate with crust and cut fine enough rhubarb to nearly fill the plate, and put it in a saucepan. Mix one-half teaspoonful cornstarch with a little cold water and stir into one-half cupful boiling water, pour over rhubarb, add a small handful of seedless raisins and at least one and a half cupfuls of sugar (the amount depends upon the acidity of the rhubarb); beat all together, but do not boll. Bake with two crusts.

Rhubarb Meringue Ple.-Beat the yolks of two eggs, add one tablespoonful cornstarch, one cupful of sugar and one cupful of finely-chopped rhubarb; turn into ple plate lined with rich crust and bake; when done cool slightly, then frost with the two whites beaten stiff, three tablespoonfuls sugar and one teaspoonful of lemon extract. Brown lightly in the oven.

Rhubarb Meringue Pie No. 2.-To ne cupful of finely-chopped rhubarb add one cupful of sugar and the grated rind of one lemon, put one teaspoonful of cornstarch in a cup, moisten with a little cold water, then fill the cup with bolling water and add to it the rhubarb, then add the beaten yolks of three eggs. Bake with one crust and when cold cover with meringues of the whites of the three eggs and three tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and brown lightly.

#### Artichokes.

The artichoke is a graceful plant, everal feet high.

Its handsome leaves and fine appearance recommend it for ornamental use. The artichoke belongs to the same family as the daisy and the sunflower. The part which is eaten is the flat,

circular disk which bears the flowers. The tender base of the disk is eaten after the heads are boiled ten-

Dressed with oil and vinegar, the tender parts of boiled artichoke make a good salad.

### Finnan Haddie.

Place fish, skin side down, in a baking pan with water enough to cover. Boil ten minutes, when skin may be easily removed. Cut off the tail well into the meat. Return to pan, using half milk and half cream instead of water. Thick slices of boiled potato should be placed snugly around the fish. Season in the pan if desired.

The unserved fish may be separated from the bones, mixed with cream or milk and cracker crumbs, well seasoned and baked. This makes a delicious lunch or side serving.

### Bag of Lettuce,

To place lettuce or parsley of celery in a cloth bag and keep directly on the ice means that the vegetable will keep fresh and crisp much longer than in any other way. Bags, all made and stamped with the name "Lettuce," "Parsley" or "Celery" may be had for 35 cents. There is a shir string at top to pull tight and keep the contents in place. It would possibly take about an hour to make one of these bags, but the comfort and satisfaction in using one cannot be computed.

### Scrambled Rice and Bacon.

Three cupfuls cooked rice, 12 slices of bacon, three eggs, beaten, salt

and pepper. Fry or bake the bacon till crisp; pour off half the fat and put the bacon aside in a warm place. Mix together the eggs and rice and add salt and pepper as needed. Pour into the hot bacon fat left in the frying pan and scramble. Heap in a mound on a hot platter and surround with the bacon. Good Housekeeping.

### Oxford Salad.

Small leaves of lettuce, three to each guest. On each slice of orange place a strip of canned red sweet pepper. Over all pour a dressing made of the juice from ends of oranges, a little of the pepper liquor and plenty of salt. Very pretty, and so good.

To Dry Cut Glass. Dry cut glass with soft tissue paper if you want it to be brilliant.



In Most Cases, However, Animal Is Most Beneficial.

Use of Specially Designed Trap Is Most Effective Method of Freeing Infested Ground-Three Devices Described.

(From the United States Department of The common garden mole, which, because of its insectivorous habits, is in most situations much more beneficial than harmful, is a decided nuls ance when it invades a well-kept lawn or a newly planted seedbed. Many reports of its damage to lawns are received by the department, and also frequent complaints of destruction of potatoes, bulbs, and plants which is wrongly attributed to the mole. Damage to plants and tubers is generally the work of pine mice or meadow mice usually the former. The burrowing habits of pine mice closely, resemble those of the mole, and they frequently use mole tunnels to reach growing plants. Pine mice may easily be killed with poisoned grain, but as moles will seldom take poisoned balts of any kind, the main dependence for destroying them is traps, and considerable experience and judgment are required to use them effectively.

The ordinary traps intended for rats and other rodents are useless for taking moles. Special mole traps, of which there are on the market three general types, are required. These may be designated as the harpoon, the scissor-jaw, and the choker types, marked a, b, and c, respectively, in the accompanying illustration. Harpoon traps are intended to impale the mole in the soil by spring-driven spikes. Scissor-jaw traps are to be set astride the runway to grasp the

mole when it attempts to pass in elther direction. The choker trap has a pair of wire loops that encircle the burrow when the trap is set. All these traps are sprung by the same sort of mechanism-a trigger pan resting on a depressed place in the mole ridge in such way as to be lifted when the animal passes beneath. No part of a set mole trap should ever be in the runway, as its presence makes the animal avoid the obstruction by burrowing around or below it.

Directions for Setting Traps. Only general directions for setting mole traps can be given here, nor are detailed instructions necessary, since the makers of traps usually furnish specific directions for using them. A mole trap can be successfully operated only when set on that part of a mole runway which is near the surface and has the soil raised into a distinct ridge, newly worked. Freshly broken soil usually indicates that the tunnel is in use. When in doubt, the operator may make a small break in the ridge and observe whether the mole repairs it within a few hours. In placing a trap, one of the stretches of the runway that leads in a definite direction should be chosen rather than one of the turns that may not be regu-

larly traversed by the mole, Before setting the trap, it is well to ascertain the course of the burrow by thrusting down a lead pencil, or stick of similar size. The trap selected should then be lined up with the course as nearly as possible; the jaws of the scissor-jaw type should straddle it, the loops of the choker type should encircle it, and the spikes of the harpoon type should be directly above it. In the case of the harpoon type, it is best to force the impaling spikes into the ground once or twice to facilitate their penetrating into the burrows when the trap is sprung. It is desirable also, in setting any of the traps, to depress only that part of the ridge immediately under the trigger pan, using the hand instead of the foot for this purpose. A little earth or a small chip of wood may be placed under the pan if necessary. The trigger catch should be set as lightly as possible, and one should avoid stepping on any part of the runway near the trap. It will pay to visit traps at least twice a day.

Moles are persistent in repairing breaks in their tunnels and may often be surprised at their work. It is easy then to capture the animal by impaling it with a fork or throwing it out by a quick thrust of spade or shovel. A section of the runway may first be broken open or leveled and the place watched until the animal is observed

#### PIG TROUGH IS A NECESSITY

For Large Animals V-Shaped Device Will Be Found Durable and Convenient-How It is Made.

The pig trough is a very necessary equipment. For large hogs a very durable and economical trough is a V-shaped one which can be made of pleces 2 by 10 and 2 by 8, but for the younger pigs smaller pieces should be used. Care should be taken in making them. If they are too high the pigs cannot feed conveniently. If too low, the pigs will get into the trough in order to get the feed.

The trough set in a fence, parallel to it, is a very satisfactory arrangement. A swinging panel can be hung above the trough. A latch slipping crosswise at the center of the panel makes it possible to swing it in and fasten it, thereby shutting out the pigs until all the feed is put into the

The pig trough should be kept clean, A thorough scrubbing occasionally will be an advantage to the animals' health, If the trough is set on a cement feeding floor there will be less dirt and

### ROOT CROPS FOR LIVE STOCK

Big Tonnage Secured From Beets and Mangels-Plants Draw Especially Heavy on Phosphorus.

Sugar beets and mangels grown for stock will produce big tonnages. Mangels like a rather cool climate and sugar beets are grown successfully in about the same general latitude that grapes are produced easily and some what north of that belt, says a writer in Farm and Home.

Put your root crops in a good fer tile soil, plowed deep and well tilled, if you expect a heavy tonnage. Work up a good seedbed and if the land is not already very rich put on some well rotted manure after plowing. Root crops draw especially heavy on phosphorus.

Plant the beets in drills with the rows far enough apart that cultivation is not difficult. Put the rows 20 to 30 inches apart. Plant about corn-planting time. You will have to hoe and thin them by hand.

On Arpil 18, 1911, William H. Taft, then president of the United States in answer to an appeal from Gov. Hunt for protection of citizens of Douglas, replied as follows: "The pressure for general intervention under such conditions it might not be practicable to resist. It is impossible to forsee or reckon the consequences of such a course and we must use the greatest self-restraint to avoid it. \* \* \* Cannot, therefore, order the troops at Douglas to cross the border, but I must ask you and the local authorities, in case the same danger recurs, to direct the people of Douglas to place themselves where bullets cannot reach them and thus avoid casualty." Instead of removing the cause of the killing of our citizens in their own country, President Taft directed that American citizens resident in Douglas, Ariz., should hide in their cellars when Mexican bullets were flying about.
