More Asbestos Produced.

The asbestos-producing industry of the United States is growing. For many years we have been the greatest manufacturers and users of asbestos, drawing our raw material from Canada, but we are now getting some excellent fiber in our own country. The most notable feature of the asbestos industry in 1914 was the development of a new field in Arizona, which is furnishing a grade of fiber that compares very favorably with the Canadian. As the mineral occurs in the Grand canyon it is frequently designated Grand Canyon asbestos, although the deposit in that remarkable natural wonder is not yet producing asbestos commercially. For electric installation the Arizona asbestos is even better than the Canadian product, for it contains a lower percentage of iron. Asbestos of a low grade has been produced in Georgia for many

BEEF SERVED WITH MACARON

Nutritious and Appetizing Dish That May Be Prepared at Comparatively Small Cost.

Two pounds of shank (or any preferred cut). Have saucepan very hot, fry out a piece of fat or grease bottom with butter, cut up meat and place in pan, allowing to fry until seared on every side. Salt and pepper, dredge with flour, pour on bolling water to just cover meat, cover closely and simmer slowly until nearly done. Do not add more water unless there is danger of going dry for you only want enough for gravy and not a stew. Twenty minutes before serving pare potatoes and add whole with small pieces of onions. At the same time put macaroni to cook in rapidly boiling water and allow to boil 15 minutes, stirring often with a fork so as not to break, then drain and add to meat. Cook all together until potatoes are done; take out thick part on deep platter, thicken gravy with tablespoonful of flour dissolved with little cold water, beat very smooth, then pour contents in platter and serve very hot. Dumplings can be added, but we never eat them. We like it made of round steak, but cheaper cuts are just as good, and really it is a delicious dish .- Boston Globe,

When cool, open the can and pour the milk, the entire contents of a small can or half the contents of a large one, into a chilled bowl, placed in another bowl filled with cracked ice. After the milk has become thoroughly chilled whip in the regular way with an ordinary egg beater for five minutes. Sweeten and flavor if desired. Keep it on ice until Condensed milk will whip without heating, but there are better results when following the above di-

CANNING TIME BEAT WALL STREET

SOME INSTRUCTIONS THAT MAY BE OF SERVICE.

Two Cardinal Points Are Cleanlinese and Complete Sterilization-Just How These May Be Most Easily Attained.

There seems to be a belief by the general public that there is something mysterious in the commercial canning process. The great secret of this process is a careful observance of two things-cleanliness and complete sterilization.

Fruits and vegetables can be "put up" in glass jars or tin cans at home much cheaper than they can be purchased in the form of commercially canned goods, and the flavor, texture and general quality of the homemade product can be made superior to the product of the average factory, writes, B. Shaw, recognized expert of South Carolina.

Minute forms of life which we call pacteria are present everywhere in untold numbers. The air we breathe, the water we drink, and the food we eat are teeming with them. These bacteria are practically the cause of the "spoiling" or fermenting of the various fruits and vegetables.

The reproduction of bacteria, which is very rapid, is brought about by one of two processes. The bacterium either divides itself into two

parts, making two bacteria where one existed before, or else reproduces itself by means of spores.

Spores may be compared with the seed of an ordinary plant. These spores present the chief difficulty in canning the products of the orchard and garden.

All forms of bacteria are killed by complete sterilization. This is nothing more than enclosing the products to be sterilized in jars or cans that can be sealed air-tight, and submitting them to heat of sufficient degree, for a time long enough, to destroy the bacteria that cause the raw material to spoil.

Sterilization is readily accomplished by the use of boiling water, and there are three different ways in which this can be done. While the parent bacteria can be killed at the temperature of boiling water, their spores retain their vitality for a long time even at that temperature.

Smaller factories, and the different home canning outfits usually make use of the "open-kettle" process. Here the cans are submerged in boiling water and kept at that temperature for a time sufficient to destroy bacteria and spores.

The third process, known as fractional sterilization, is that of keeping cans or jars in boiling water for a spethis sentiment. cifled time upon each of two or three consecutive days.

The process of boiling upon consecutive days is the safest method, and is much to be preferred in home canning The first day's boiling kills practically all the bacteria, but does not kill all all of the spores. As soon as the jars or cans cool,

these spores develop, and a new lot of bacteria begin their destructive work on the contents. The second day's boiling kills this

new lot of bacteria before they have had time to produce spores. Bolling the third day is not always

necessary, but it is advisable in order to be sure that sterilization is com-

Baked Fish Pudding. The remains of boiled fish can be

utilized in this way: Carefully remove the flesh from the bones; cut it up into small dice, and have an equal bulk of mashed potatoes. Put both into a basin and mix together; then melt some butter and pour it in, mixing well; add salt and pepper and a few grains of cayenne pepper; beat up an egg and add it last; mix all well together; put it in a pudding dish, smooth and score neatly on the top. Bake for half an

Fish Flakes With Bacon.

Boll potatoes in salted water until tender; add two cupfuls of flaked fish, a fourth of a teaspoonful of pepper and a beaten egg. Take up by the rounding tablespoonful, shape lightly and fry in deep fat to a delicate amber color. Roll slices of bacon into cylinders, run a toothpick through each to hold it in place and fry until well cooked. Serve a bacon roll with each fish ball.

Walnut Croquettes.

This rule calls for one cupful of bread crumbs and a like amount of mashed potatoes and of chopped English walnuts. Add the yolks of two or three eggs, salt and pepper to taste and a little onion if desired. After shaping the mixture into croquette forms they should be baked in a moderate oven for 20 minutes.

THE REAL INVESTOR IS THE MAN WHO WINS.

Gambler May Make Money by Lucky Chance, but He Loses in the End -Patience Is Necessary

to Success.

The man with a long vision wins in Wall street. This means that the winner must be a student of values. He must be famillar with the factors that make for or against prosperity, for Wall street is the barometer of trade. If the outlook is unfavorable to business, it will be reflected by a declining tendency in the stock market, and when conditions favor prosperity they will be forecast by a rise in the financial barometer.

I have never known one who merely "gambled" in Wall street, that is, one who bought and sold on the chance of winning or losing, who was ever successful in the end, Jasper writes in Leslie's. He might make money by a lucky chance, just as he would at a game of cards or throwing dice, but in the end the odds were against him.

With very few exceptions I have known of no one who invested in Wall street securities with knowledge of what he was buying who did not come out with a final profit. It takes a long beaded, patient man to this, however, and patience is not one of the redeeming virtues of the American people.

Some observant financiers, including one of the ablest in the country, the Honorable A. Barton Hepburn of New York, think that they see a slight halt in the wave of prosperity that we have been enjoying by reason of the war abroad. They fear a marked but temporary subsidence of this wave on the conclusion of peace, which may not be far off. Observers also think that in some lines of business promotion of new securities has been overdone and that the mass of "indigestible securities," as the late J. P. Morgan called them, may prove to be a drug upon the market.

I note that English papers are inclined to believe that peace may come suddenly and unexpectedly, though not in the near future. Many who recall the bitterness of the contest abroad believe that it will prolong the struggle for two or three years to come, or at least until the resources of some of the contending parties are more nearly exhausted. A breakdown in Austria is first looked for.

The greatest prosperity factor, outside of the crop situation, so far as this country is concerned is the presidential election. It does not escape observation that as election day approaches, the leaders of both political parties are expressing a greater interest in the consideration of business. The voters are making up their minds as to which party can best be depended upon for the constructive legislation that our industries and railways. require. Everybody wants prosperity and every thoughtful voter will be on the side of the candidate who promises

to help prosperity. As the campaign proceeds and as the utterances of the presidential candidates are heard and weighed, the judgment of the public will be formed, and as soon as it becomes apparent that this judgment will be in favor of a candidate distinctly representing a constructive policy, the stock market and business generally will reflect

YOW THE HAREM FIGURES IN LIFE OF THE ORIENT.

German Writer Asserts That Western Travelers Have Given Out an Entirely Wrong Impression of the Institution.

The West brought its civilization o the East, but one thing the Western people were unable to drive away from the Orient was the harem. The Oriental will stick to his harem. To overturn this old institution would make an end of culture in the Orient.

The harem is a home for women nembers of the family, widowed mothers, old maid aunts and others of the family branch. Even old servants, unfit for further service, are taken into the harem.

The word harem means "holy place," protected home, and not what is falsely understood a place where rich Orientals hide and maintain their many wives. The children born is barems are kept there and carefully nursed by their mothers. Therefore the death rate in these refuges is very small.

Conversations in the harems are car ried on so that the children do not understand what is said in their presence, and as the children are always under the special care of their mothers, servants have no opportunity to teach such children things they should not know.

Married life is one of trust, love and bedience. The middle classes live in homes according to their means, the wives with their children on the second floor, where a man's eye cannot reach. Sultans and khedives generally have for their wives separate palaces, some of them decorated in the best Western styles, the rooms are darkened through Venetian blinds, which gives them a gloomy appearance. Where several wives live in one house each one has her separate household. The wives meet often by special invitation; they live in harmony together; there is no petty jealousy, each knows that the law allows the husband a certain number of wives. It is wrong to think that bridegroom and bride-to-be have to marry each other by the will of the parents. The parents certainly make the proposal, but the young people are


