TURK'S 'SANCTUM'

HOW THE HAREM FIGURES IN LIFE OF THE ORIENT.

German Writer Asserts That Western Travelers Have Given Out an Entirely Wrong Impression of the Institution.

The West brought its civilization to the East, but one thing the Western people were unable to drive away from the Orient was the harem.

The harem is a home for women members of the family, widowed mothers, old maid aunts and others of the family branch.

"The word harem means 'holy place,' a protected home, and not what is falsely understood a place where rich Orientals hide and maintain their many wives."

Conversations in the harems are carried on so that the children do not understand what is said in their presence, and as the children are always under the special care of their mothers, servants have no opportunity to teach such children things they should not know.

Married life is one of trust, love and obedience. The middle classes live in homes according to their means, the wives with their children on the second floor, where a man's eye cannot reach.

Western people have accused the Turks of polygamy, which is denied by the Oriental and the accusation returned with the remark, the Western men are worse, for they flee from flower to flower, but no one brings any of these flowers home to make her his wife.

The Oriental, rich or poor, does not allow his wife to do laborious work; she has to live for her husband and children only. He wants her to live in ease and comfort, and to accomplish this, the husband deprives himself of many things, to give his wife and children all the comfort possible.

Turkish men seldom are rude to the female population, but many Europeans who don't know the laws and customs of the Orientals, are the cause of the harem ladies being compelled to veil.—Impression of Institution.

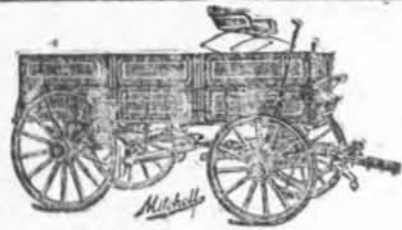

DEEDS VS. TALK

In the fall of 1915 proposed woman's suffrage amendments to the constitution of New York and New Jersey were submitted to the voters of those states. President Wilson made a special trip from Washington to Princeton to register and another special trip to vote for votes for women. The records of the Board of Elections of New York county fail to disclose that you, Mr. Hughes, either registered or voted on this occasion. Furthermore, the records show that since 1910 you have wholly neglected to vote—the highest duty of a citizen.

Amid all this talk about preparedness against armed attack and commercial rivalry after the war, it may be in order to inquire what preparation is being made to fill the place of Mr. Roosevelt when he shall have been taken from us. Rail at the Colonel, and criticize him as we will, it must be acknowledged that he has written his name large on the page of American history. He is a doer as well as a talker; and many an act of vast portent can be traced directly or indirectly to his influence. His judgment has not been faultless, but his industry is ceaseless, and his spirit unflagging. He has broad vision, and is given to bold execution. Mistakes he has made, as who has not, but he has rectified some. In 1908 he gave us President Taft. But he regretted his act, and in 1912 he elected President Wilson. And there can be little doubt that his present 'skin-'em-'alive' speeches have made certain the President's re-election.—The Public.

This is the last issue of this paper before election, 1916. Next week's paper will tell all about it. Just now most good American citizens are very much interested in the outcome of the election. As is well known, The Patagonian is Democratic. That is, it believes the best interests of the United States will be best conserved by electing the Democratic nominees for national and state offices, rather than by electing the Republican nominees. It may be that the majority of voters in the United States will disagree with this. After Tuesday's election we will know. At any rate, there is one point upon which both Democrats and Republicans, and members of all other parties for that matter, may unite in giving thanks. Whichever way the election goes, it will not mean a call to arms; to most of us things will move along in about the same old way. While we may all not be agreed upon things political, let us give thanks that we are all at least Americans, and unlike another so-called republic close by, we will all abide by the decision of the ballots.

From this moment till you cast your vote next Tuesday, beware of the famous campaign lie. They never fail to appear in the last days preceding an election.
