

Systematic Work to Be Continued on the Red Mountain

Work on the Andes group in Red Mountain, under bond from R. R. Richardson to C. C. Sanders and associates, is going ahead regularly and with much promise. The winze from the tunnel is said to be still in the copper glance, and the initial shipment of 50,000 pounds will be made from this property in a day or two.

The ore is causing considerable comment from mining people of the district. Nearly everyone in town and many strangers passing through have examined the dump as it is being added to by each burro train. What the shipment will run is a matter of conjecture, being variously estimated at from 10 to 25 per cent copper. Great quantities of copper glance (chalcocite) in the ore will bring up the value of the shipment, notwithstanding that there is lots of waste in the ore.

The proximity of Red Mountain to the camp of Patagonia is probably one of the causes of interest being centered upon this most recent strike, as well as the excellent character of the ore. It is only about two miles just back of town, and it is realized if a big mine is found in Red Mountain it will guarantee a splendid future for Patagonia.

Manager Sanders, the engineer in charge at the Andes, is optimistic but not at all excited over the showing. He says it is yet too early to make any predictions as to what the strike will amount to. Greater depth must be reached, he says, before any definite idea can be formed of the extent of the ore body. He is hopeful of developing a mine on Red Mountain, and states that conservative, systematic work is to be pursued.

Jas. H. Reagan left this week for his mining property in Sonora, which he expects to open up again, now that conditions in Mexico appear to be somewhat more tranquil. Farmer Jim measures his ore reserves in a different manner from the usual custom among miners. He says he has about 40 acres of good copper land and expects to ship to Canada about 60 bushels a day.

Copper Outlook Is About as Good as Could Be Desired

Copper continues very strong. Luke is 23 3/4 to 24 cents and electrolytic is 23 1/2 to 24 cents a pound. Although all previous records have been broken by the volume of sales put through in the past three months, the demand apparently is not yet satisfied. Spot copper is extremely scarce, and this creates a condition which may possibly lead to an abnormal price advance in the near future, says Walker's Weekly Copper Letter in Boston Commercial.

Producing companies sold immense tonnages of copper recently for delivery four, five, six and eight months in advance at prices ranging all the way from 21 to 23 cents a pound. Consumers evidently expect a severe shortage, and they are covering their requirements farther ahead than they ever did previously in the history of the trade.

The Interstate Commerce Commission car of engineers and surveyors was in Patagonia this week, checking up the Southern Pacific's right of way and other holdings in this community.

The Patagonian office moved this week from its location on Duquesne avenue to a building on the main street. Considerable new equipment has been added.

Quite number of Patagonia people attended the dance at Fruitland hall last Saturday night. A good time is reported.

Work in the east and west drifts at the Buffalo group at Jefferson Camp in the Harshaw district is progressing. The ore is said to be looking better.

Crosscut at the Lee Shaft of Ruby Co. to Be Driven 600 ft.

Chas. Wittig, who has the contract for driving a crosscut from the 450 level of the Lee shaft for the Ruby Copper company, was this week notified from the Kansas City office of the company that the crosscut was to be continued for a distance of 600 feet. The original contract called for only 100 feet. Mr. Wittig has a good crew at work and the crosscut will be rushed to completion.

This work is expected to develop a big area of commercial copper ore, as previous work at the Ruby has proven copper values of considerable extent. While a mill will probably be established on this property, eventually, with the present high price of copper, it, like other mines in the Patagonia country, can now ship ores at a fair profit carrying lower values than formerly.

Mr. Wittig says that black copper sulphides have already been encountered in the work of crosscutting, although just started. This ore will be shipped as taken out.

Duquesne Mines to Increase Shipments

The mill of the Duquesne Mining & Reduction company, a recently installed flotation system, has been temporarily shut down on account of lack of sufficient water. The flotation process had proved a success in the treatment of the Duquesne ores, which carry a high percentage of zinc. It is said to be the intention of the management to install a pumping plant on the Santa Cruz river somewhere near the international boundary line and pipe water to the plant, a distance of several miles. It is also believed that when the water question has been satisfactorily settled, the mill will be enlarged.

The mine will continue shipping its high grade ores to the Douglas smelter from Patagonia while the work of developing more water for the mill is in process. The Duquesne is a Westinghouse property, and is one of the most faithful producers in this part of the state, its ores being a very high-grade copper.
