#### NO SHELTER FOR MURDERERS

Oliver Cromwell First to Put Limit on Protection Afforded by House of an Ambassador.

It was the grim old Oliver Cromwell who first showed that the house of an ambassador was not an inviolable sanctuary for all classes of offenders and that at least the line of protection could not hold against a murderer. In November, 1652, Don Pantaleon Sa, brother of an ambassador from Portugal to England, walking in the New Exchange, London, engaged in a quarrel with a young English gentleman named Gerrard. They were separated, leaving Gerrard slightly wounded in the shoulder. The next day Don Pantaleon came to the exchange with fifty well-armed followers, for revenge. Four Englishmen were slightly wounded and a Mr. Greenway, while walking with his sister and a lady to whom he was engaged, being mistaken for Gerrard, was killed by a pistol shot through the head. A great and enraged crowd collected. The Portuguese took refuge in their house of embassy. Cromwell, the lord protector, sent a messenger to the embassy, stating that if the criminals were not given up to the civil authorities the soldiers guarding the embassy would be withdrawn and and freshly boiled. the mob left to do as it pleased. Don Pantaleon, three Portuguese and "ar English boy' were given up and committed to Newgate. Their trial was delayed A mixed jury of Englishmen and foreigners brought in a verdict of guilty and the five were sentenced to be hanged. The three Portuguese were pardoned, the "English boy" was hanged and Don Pantaleon, at the request of his brother, the ambassador, was spared from hanging and was beheaded on July 10, 1653. This case impressed foreign nations with a sense of Cromwell's power, and has ever since been sonsidered as a precedent in questions respecting the privilege of ambassadors and the

#### REQUIRES CARE IN MAKING

Tea, to Be at Its Best, Must Be Prepared Under Exactly the Proper Conditions.

There is practically no nutriment in ea, though there are small amounts of mineral salts. The principal ingredients are caffein, which stimulates the nerves; volatile oils, which give the flavor, and tannic acid, which retards the digestion!

The Japanese have made a religious and aesthetic ceremonial of tea-drinking, and, like the mineral waters whose efficiency is found to depend largely on the change and rest accompanying their drinking, the afternoon tea has its psychological as well as its physiological reasons for the pleasant results produced.

Like all beverages which refresh by stimulating, tea should be used with great discretion.

Less tea is used to the cup than in the case of coffee-one-half to one teaspoonful as compared to one tablespoonful. A mild cup of tea well made will not hurt a healthy person, and, although the stimulating principle is the same, tea does not seem to have so direct or so pronounced an effect on the central nervous system as does coffee. Children, people with gastric troubles or those who are nervous should not drink tea.

Green tea contains much more tannic acid than black tea. Be sure it does not boil or stand on the leaves if you use it.

Hard or stale water does not make good tea. It should be freshly drawn

Boiling any tea is a crime. The caffein is readily soluble and is quickly obtained in solution. Boiling or long standing on the leaves only results in more of the injurious tannic acid being extracted and spoils the flavor as well as making the beverage more

#### COVERS FOR SWEEPING DAYS

Provision May Be Made That Will Do Away With Much Annoyance on Those Occasions.

To find the necessary coverings on sweeping days has often sent the maid scurrying about for old aprons, sheets, towels and anything else she could lay her hands on to use for this pur-

A friend of mine has solved the difficulty in this way: She purchased a quantity of gray cambric and made from it a large sheet with which to cover the beds and sideboard; smaller covers for dressers and toilet tables were made and still others, in suitable shapes, were designed to put over the lamps, mantels and the like. She also made from the cambric a bag to keep the covers in; this was hung in the broom closet.

While light, the cambric formed a perfect protection against dust, and a simple shaking when the sweeping was finished freed the covers from the dust that had settled upon them, so, that they required washing but once a month. The use of these dust covers saved much valuable time and extra work. The cost of a set is moderate and it does not take long to make them .- Pittsburgh Dispatch.

HOT WEATHER.

Apples, Celery, and Walnuts Mixed Well Together Make One of the Best-Watercress Is Excellent -With Oranges and Grapes.

Apple, Celery and Walnut Salad .-Cut into cubes two apples, pared, and one apple with the red skin left on, a few stalks of celery and a cupful of walnut meats. Stir in a bowl with some salad dressing. Pile a spoonful of this on a lettuce leaf, with a dot of the dressing on top. Use the rest of the lettuce head for lettuce sandwiches at supper time.

Watercress Salad,-Make an ordinary potato salad, chopped potatoes, with a little raw onlon. Arrange in oval mound on platter. Divide into quarters with knives, leaving the knives in the salad. Cover two opposite corners with chopped beets, Of the remaining two corners cover one with sifted yolk of hard-bolled egg and the other with the white, chopped. Marinate with French dressing and set away to chill. Just before serving remove knives and in the cross left put sprays of parsley. Also surround salnd with parsley. This salad is very attractive.

Pecan and Potato Salad .- Mix two cupfuls of diced cooked potatoes with one cupful of broken pecan meats, sprinkle with salt, marinate with French dressing, turn into a salad bowl rubbed lightly with garlic, surround with watercress and garnish with halves of pecan nut meats.

Veal and Cabbage Salad .- Mix two upfuls of cold cooked veni cut into dice with one cupful of finely chopped cabbage, moisten with salad dressing and serve in nests of lettuce leaves.

Orange and Grape Salad .- Pare two eedless oranges, cutting deep enough to remove all the white, and cut the pulp into small pieces. Add an equal quantity of malaga grapes from which the seeds have been removed and one tablespoonful of canned pimento cut into tiny strips; moisten with French dressing and serve in nests of lettuce leaves.

Turnip and Onion Salad,-Peel one large white and one yellow turnip, boil in salted water until tender, drain, cool and cut into dice. Peel and cut a medium-sized Bermuda onion in thin slices. Arrange the turnips and onions in alternate layers in the form of a pyramid, surround with slices of hardboiled eggs and pickled beets cut in fancy shapes and serve with French or boiled dressing.

#### Fried Frogs' Legs.

Place two dozen frogs' legs in an earthen dish containing a marmalade composed of two tablespoonfuls of olive oil, the juice of a small lemon, one small onion sliced, a branch of parsley, two bay leaves, one-half teaspoonful of salt and one fourth teapoonful of paprika. #### MANY POINTS ABOUT CIGAR

Not Alone Must "Weed" Have Proper Flavor, But Other Things Have to Be Given Consideration.

A cigar should have four cardinal virtues. The first and most important is a good burn-that is, the burn must be even, the cigar must hold its fire, the ash should be coherent and not flaky, and there must be no charring in advance of the burn.

The second point relates to the flavor. This is important to the smoker-the cigar must tickle his palate The third essential point has to do with the aroma, which is the pleasure giving quality of the smoke, not only to the smoker, but to the bystander Even though a cigar has a rich smooth, mellow flavor, it should be classed as a poor one if it gives off a bouquet which is offensive to all within range of its fumes.

Finally, a cigar should have a good appearance. Really, it is surprising how important this is. No matter how fine the burn, or how pleasing the flavor or aroma, a cigar must look the part in order to be good. Given two cigars of equal quality, the one which looks the best will actually taste the best.-Cigarology of Henry Reist Kraybill of the University of Chicago

#### Relic of Sun Worship.

It probably had its origin in Egypt and was spread throughout the world by early missionaries.
