#### Declaration of War With Germany Now \*Expected Any Time

Washington, D. C .- Every phase of the situation which at any hour may bring the United States to war with dent Wilson and his advisers at daily ler, the barber and mining man. cabinet meetings. The faint hope that Germany, after all, might modify her new submarine campaign to avoid making an active enemy of America has been touched upon, as has been the probable position of other neutrals. But most of the cabinet's attention has been given to reports by each member upon the energetic efforts of his department of the government to prepare for war if it is to come.

In some quarters here the interview given by Foreign Minister Zimmerman in Berlin, in expressing friendly feeling toward the United States, was regarded as a favorable sign. Little weight was attached to it by the cabinet, however, for the foreign minister's remark that he hoped the American government would understand Germany's reasons for inaugurating unrestricted warfare on the sea was construed as meaning that no change of course was to be expected.

It was explained authoritatively that the next step of the United States, if one is necessary, will be taken without American lives or ships are illegally destroyed by the Germans, action will follow as soon as the fact is established to the president's satisfaction.

Secretary Houston told the cabinet that data in the hands of the department of agriculture shows that the United States can be self-sustaining, no matter what may happen to cut her off from the rest of the world.

The president read with gratification offers from manufacturing and business concerns in all parts of the United States to assist the government in every way possible, in case of war, with their plants.

A dispatch from Amsterdam says that a wireless telegram has appeared in the German papers stating that Gen. Carranza has sent his best wishes to the German emperor from Queretaro.



## **DURING THE PAST WEEK**

RECORD OF IMPORTANT EVENTS CONDENSED FOR BUSY

ABOUT THE WAR Petrograd reports scouting and in-

fantry fighting in Rumania. Near Gueudecourt, in the Somme region, British troops took sixty prison-

ers in a raid.

Considerable aerial activity continues over the lines in France. London reports the destruction of three German machines.

Army of 2,000,000 men will be raised with Germany, according to plans worked out by general staff at Washington.

The German submarine recently reported sunk near Hammerfest was the U-27, commanded by Captain Benber, according to information received at Christiania,

The French government has decided to mobilize the entire civilian population of France between the ages of 16 and 60 for national defense. Both sexes will be included in the mobilization.

In northwest Persia the Turks are credited with gains over the Russians by Berlin. Reconnoitering engagements continue around Kut-El-Amara and a heavy bombardment also is in progress there.

Euphrates, Belgium relief steamer, was the first ship to fall victim to new submarine policy. Another Belgian vessel has been destroyed. Lloyd's announces loss of three British, two Norwegian ships and one Spanish vessel.

Atlantic fleet of approximately fifty warships is concentrated at Guantanamo, Cuba, from where it can best move to protect either Panama canal or Atlantic seaports. Tenders loaded with torpedoes are being dispatched to Guantanamo,

Bad weather hampers large scale operations of the eastern and Macedonian fronts. Near Solotvina, southwest of Brzezany in Galicia, German troops, Petrograd says, entered a Russian trench, but were later driven back to their own line.

Petrograd reports a Russian advance near Kalnzem, southwest of Riga, and the repulse of three attacks by the Austro-Germans against the Russians east of Jacobeni, near the northern Rumanian frontier. Small actions also have occurred in the Narayuvka river region in Galicia.

#### WESTERN

The fourth annual meeting of the Pikes Peak Ocean-to-Ocean Highway Association will convene in St. Joseph, Mo., on Tuesday, Feb. 13.

The Young prohibition bill, believed to be the most drastic measure ever indorsed by a state Legislature, passed both houses of the Utah Legislature.

Six men attempting to walk the tops of freight cars in the Soldiers Summit district, about fifty miles from Sait Lake, were caught in a gale and hurled into snow banks. A verdict of not guilty was returned

at San Angelo, Tex., by the jury in the case of Harry J. Spanell of Alpine, Tex., tried on a charge of killing his wife, Crystal Holland Spanell, last July.

Mrs. R. M. Bushong, arrested in Denver on Nov. 7 in company with William Turner, with whom she had eloped from Kansas after he had kiled her husband with an ax, was acquitted as being an accessory to the crime by a jury at Wilson, Kan,

Maj. Gen. John J. Persbing arrived at Ojo Federico, forty miles north of Colonia Dublan, according to telephone messages from Columbus. The Twenty-fourth United States infantry (colored), the first unit to break camp, left Tres Papelotes (Three Windmills) for Vado Fusiles.

#### WASHINGTON

The annual fortifications bill, carrying \$51,000,000, passed by the House, was passed by Senate unamended,

An increase of 25 per cent in the grazing fees on all national forests, instead of 33 1-3 per cent as originally contemplated, will be made for the 1917 season.

Immediate construction of 100 submarines, eighty for coast defense and twenty for fleet operations, was proposed in a special bill introduced by Senator Poindexter of Washington,

There apparently is no division in official opinion that Germany's announcement justifies this country in severing diplomatic relations or taking belligerent steps to safeguard

American rights. Japan's representations to the United States against the anti-alien land bills pending in the Idaho and Oregon legislatures, although made informally through her embassy, are considered no less serious at this critical juncture of international affairs than her protests against the California laws four years ago.

#### The total of British casualties as reported in the published lists during January are 960 officers and 31,394

Baron de Cartier de Marchienne, the Belgian minister at Peking, has been appointed minister of Belgium at Washington.

FOREIGN

Germany has decided upon martial law at Brussels, as a consequence of the forthcoming new deportation or ders for 60,000 Belgian workers.

Danish export steamers carrying agricultural products and mails to England, will discontinue their sailings, as will the ships of various other companies.

The Canadian Parliament at Ottawa voted unanimously a war credit for the coming year of \$500,000,000. Sir Robert Borden estimated that the cost for the next fiscal year would be \$433,274,000,

It is stated on competent authority that at the beginning of the war there were confiscated in the ports of the central powers ninety-nine hostile ships with a total gross tonnage of 189,000. Of these ships ninety-five ject. with a total gross tonnage of 173,500 were British.

"The burden on my shoulders is overwhelming," said Premier Lloyd by conscription in the event of a war George in responding to a municipal welcome at Criccieth, Wales, his home, "but I am confident that, with the united efforts of us all and with the justice of our cause, we shall confound the devices of the wicked one."

> Great Britain and her allies are prepared to meet Germany's moves in her submarine campaign, it was athoritatively asserted in shipping circles in London. The entente powers were convinced weeks ago that ruthless warfare with undersea boats would be decreed sooner or later and have known for ten days that the decision had been reached.

Count von Hertling, the Bavarlan premier, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from The Hague, in address ing the Bavarian diet, said: "We know that America will not remain silent under our submarine warfare, but the time for considering other people's opinions has passed, in view of this being the only possible way of bringing the war to a successful end, Nothing can stop us from our plan, whatever the consequences."





## Safety in the Home GERMAN U-BOAT SINKS U.S. SHIP

COLORADOAN ON HOUSATONIC WHEN LIVES OF 25 AMER-ICANS PERILED

## BRITISH RESCUE CREW

FEDERAL OFFICIALS SEIZE EIGHT INTERNED GERMAN SHIPS AND HOLD CREWS.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

Washington, Feb. 6. -- Germany yielded to Wilson's demands for "immediate release" of seventy-two American seamen taken from British merchantmen and held as prisoners of war. Washington also learns that Germans were within rights in sinking Housatonic, which carried contraband, and exercised unusual precautions to prevent loss of Americans aboard vessel,

London, Feb. 5.-The American steamer Housatonic has been sunk by a German submarine. The Housa tonic was sunk near the Scilly islands. The rumor is current that the Housatonic was sunk without warning, but the crew saved. One American from Colorado was aboard. The total number of Americans on the ship was twenty-five.

The Housatonic sailed from Galveston Jan, 6 and from Newport News Jan. 16 for London. She formerly was the Hamburg-American line steamer Georgia, and American registry was granted to her in April, 1915. Prior to that time she had been laid up at New Orleans since the beginning of the war.

The Housatonic was submarined at noon Feb. 3. All of the officers and crew were saved by a British armed steamer.

Galveston, Tex .- The steamship Housatonic sailed from here Jan. 6 for London, via Newport News. She carried 144,200, busnels of wheat from this port.

Boston, Mass.-United States Marshal Mitchell Saturday night took physical possession of the North German Lloyd liner Kronprinzessin Cecelle. The Kronprinzessin Cecelle was found to be crippled beyond possibility of early usefulness.

Philadelphia. - Saturday night the interned German auxillary cruisers Kronprinz Wilhelm and Prinz Eitel Friedrich were seized by order of the Navy Department, and their crews imprisoned in an isolation barracks.

Panama,-Four Hamburg-American line steamships, which have been in Cristobal harbor, were seized by the canal zone authorities.

New York.-Word reached the police that, coincident with the publica tion of the news of the rupture with Germany, the Austrian freighter Himalaya, which has been lying in Newark, bay, an estuary of New York harbor, has been put out of commission

Washington.-Lieut, Hans Berg and his German prize crew were removed from the liner Appam at Newport News, Va., Saturday by coast guard cutters, under direction of a United States marshal. The ship is in the custody of the Federal Court pending appeal to the Supreme Court from a decision awarding her to her English owners.

Having voluntarily submitted to in terment, these vessels actually are in custody of the United States govern ment, subject to such disposition of ships and crews as the government sees fit to make.

There is no intention on the part of the United States to seize the German merchantmen laid up in American ports as matters now stand. Such a step admittedly would be an act of war, which the government has no idea of committing.

Arsenals and Army Posts Guarded. New York.—The entire National Guard of New York state and the naval militia were ordered out Saturday night by Gov. Whitman after a conference with Maj. Gen. John F. O'. Ryan, Gen, O'Ryan was directed to have every arsenal, armory and watershed adequately guarded by the militiamen, and Commodore Forshew of the naval militia was told to protect all bridges.

Congress Leaders Approve Wilson. Washington,-Leaders in Congress without regard to politics expressed freely their approval of President Wil son's course and of his address.

Washington.-Precautions to safe guard naval stations, army posts and arsenals, and other service property were military measures taken follow ing the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany. President Wil son conferred briefly after his address to Congress with Secretary Baker and Secretary Daniels, The conference, it was stated, had to do entirely with precautionary steps, although the secretaries also probably gave some gen eral information as to the nation's preparedness for war.

## BRITISH ENTER **TEUTON TRENCHES**

RUSSIANS REPULSED IN SERIES OF CHARGES AGAINST FOES ON THE RIVER AA.

## NIGHT RAID NEAR YPRES

BRITISH KILL MANY TEUTONS CLAD LIKE KU KLUX KLAN IN AMERICA.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

With the British Armies in France (via London)-Feb. 6.-The German raiders who made two attacks Thursday morning against the British trenches south of the Ypres salient, looked for all the world like the famous Ku Klux Klan, the Crusaders of reconstruction days in the Southern states of America. They were clad in white sheets fashioned into a sort of smock, were white hoods and masks, and sought thus to cross the snow covered No Man's Land without detec tion. The raiders came over in two waves, only to be hurled back with heavy losses in killed and wounded.

On none of the war fronts has there been any fighting of great moment. The Russians and Germans have continued their operations in several of the sectors near Riga. The Russians admit the penetration of their trenches by the Germans along the Kalnzem road southeast of Riga, but say they were driven back later in a counter attack. Berlin records the epulse of Russian attacks along the

Small attacks, mostly by raiding parties, and bombardments continue to prevail on the front in France and Belgium. At several points a surprise attack has given the British and French German trench elements,

CONSCRIPTION URGED BY TAFT.

Former President Believes Army Should Be increased, "Now the War Is on Us,"

New York.-Conscription to build up an army for the country's defense, "now the war is on us" and for the future as well, was advocated by former President William H. Taft in an address on the League to Enforce Peace before the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Science.

"Stirred as the people are by enthusiasm, at the break with Germany, they would support a conscription measure," Mr. Taft believed, 'not only to meet the situation, but for the future after the war shall end."

Conscription until now, he said, has been of "doubtful expediency," because popular opposition might have halted all plans for reasonable preparedness. "Now the war is on us. however," he continued, "now that the people see the necessity, why should we not take advantage of this state of public mind and do what justice and real democracy require? Military duty is part of every citizen's duty." German Captain Gives Up Kaiser.
