

Declaration of War With Germany Now Expected Any Time

Washington, D. C.—Every phase of the situation which at any hour may bring the United States to war with Germany is being discussed by President Wilson and his advisers at daily cabinet meetings. The faint hope that Germany, after all, might modify her new submarine campaign to avoid making an active enemy of America has been touched upon, as has been the probable position of other neutrals. But most of the cabinet's attention has been given to reports by each member upon the energetic efforts of his department of the government to prepare for war if it is to come.

In some quarters here the interview given by Foreign Minister Zimmerman in Berlin, in expressing friendly feeling toward the United States, was regarded as a favorable sign. Little weight was attached to it by the cabinet, however, for the foreign minister's remark that he hoped the American government would understand Germany's reasons for inaugurating unrestricted warfare on the sea was construed as meaning that no change of course was to be expected.

It was explained authoritatively that the next step of the United States, if one is necessary, will be taken without addressing any inquiry to Germany. If American lives or ships are illegally destroyed by the Germans, action will follow as soon as the fact is established to the president's satisfaction.

Secretary Houston told the cabinet that data in the hands of the department of agriculture shows that the United States can be self-sustaining, no matter what may happen to cut her off from the rest of the world.

The president read with gratification offers from manufacturing and business concerns in all parts of the United States to assist the government in every way possible, in case of war, with their plants.

A dispatch from Amsterdam says that a wireless telegram has appeared in the German papers stating that Gen. Carranza has sent his best wishes to the German emperor from Queretaro.

An income tax collector, sent out from Washington to collect taxes from people whose income exceeds \$4000 a year, was in Patagonia a few days this week, but he did not make the trip here especially to collect the income tax from the editor of this paper, as many seem to believe.

C. R. Holcomb is out at the old Anaconda mine this week, moving the machinery down to the Pinal. Included in the outfit, which has been lying idle at the Anaconda property for several years, but which will now be put to use at the Pinal, is a 60-horse-power boiler, compressor, etc.

Fine copper ore is being taken out of the Volcano group, owned by Richard Farrell, this week. This is one of the best located of the numerous good properties in the Patagonia country. It is southeast of the famous Three R and it is said the same big iron dyke which runs through the Three R is easily traceable on the Volcano claims.

Tom Gardner is having ore hauled down from his lease from the Duquesne company this week for shipment to the smelters. To Dedicate the New Bridge Across Santa Cruz River Feb. 14

The new bridge across the Santa Cruz river, several miles this side of Nogales, built by an appropriation from the State and county, was this week completed and thrown open for traffic. It is a splendid structure, being built with the same thoroughness and detail that characterizes all the State bridges throughout Arizona.

As a connecting link between the county seat of Nogales and the upper part of the county the importance of the new bridge can hardly be overestimated. Before its completion citizens of Patagonia and the Elgin-Sonoita country, as well as those from the Duquesne-Washington region, were often unable to get to Nogales for sometimes days or even weeks, owing to the summer rains, when the river could not be forded.

To dedicate the new bridge, it is planned to have suitable services at the river on Wednesday, February 14, at which time De Facto Governor Campbell, State Engineer Lamar Cobb and other celebrities will be present. A motorcade from Nogales will go out, and everyone in this part of the county is invited to be present. The dedication ceremonies will start about 3 o'clock in the afternoon and a large crowd is expected.

GERMAN U-BOAT SINKS U.S. SHIP

COLORADOAN ON HOUSATONIC
WHEN LIVES OF 25 AMERICANS PERILED

BRITISH RESCUE CREW

FEDERAL OFFICIALS SEIZE EIGHT
INTERNED GERMAN SHIPS
AND HOLD CREWS.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Germany yielded to Wilson's demands for "immediate release" of seventy-two American seamen taken from British merchantmen and held as prisoners of war. Washington also learns that Germans were within rights in sinking Housatonic, which carried contraband, and exercised unusual precautions to prevent loss of Americans aboard vessel.

London, Feb. 5.—The American steamer Housatonic has been sunk by a German submarine. The Housatonic was sunk near the Scilly Islands. The rumor is current that the Housatonic was sunk without warning, but the crew saved. One American from Colorado was aboard. The total number of Americans on the ship was twenty-five.

The Housatonic sailed from Galveston Jan. 6 and from Newport News Jan. 16 for London. She formerly was the Hamburg-American line steamer Georgia, and American registry was granted to her in April, 1915. Prior to that time she had been laid up at New Orleans since the beginning of the war.

The Housatonic was submerged at noon Feb. 3. All of the officers and crew were saved by a British armed steamer.

Galveston, Tex.—The steamship Housatonic sailed from here Jan. 6 for London, via Newport News. She carried 144,200 bushels of wheat from this port.

Boston, Mass.—United States Marshal Mitchell Saturday night took physical possession of the North German Lloyd liner Kronprinzessin Cecelle. The Kronprinzessin Cecelle was found to be crippled beyond possibility of early usefulness.

Philadelphia.—Saturday night the interned German auxiliary cruisers Kronprinz Wilhelm and Prinz Eitel Friedrich were seized by order of the Navy Department, and their crews imprisoned in an isolation barracks.

Panama.—Four Hamburg-American line steamships, which have been in Cristobal harbor, were seized by the canal zone authorities.

New York.—Word reached the police that, coincident with the publication of the news of the rupture with Germany, the Austrian freighter Himalaya, which has been lying in Newark bay, an estuary of New York harbor, has been put out of commission.

Washington.—Lieut. Hans Berg and his German prize crew were removed from the liner Appam at Newport News, Va., Saturday by coast guard cutters, under direction of a United States marshal. The ship is in the custody of the Federal Court pending appeal to the Supreme Court from a decision awarding her to her English owners.

Having voluntarily submitted to internment, these vessels actually are in custody of the United States government, subject to such disposition of ships and crews as the government sees fit to make.

There is no intention on the part of the United States to seize the German merchantmen laid up in American ports as matters now stand. Such a step admittedly would be an act of war, which the government has no idea of committing.

Arsenals and Army Posts Guarded. New York.—The entire National Guard of New York state and the naval militia were ordered out Saturday night by Gov. Whitman after a conference with Maj. Gen. John F. O'Ryan. Gen. O'Ryan was directed to have every arsenal, armory and watershed adequately guarded by the militiamen, and Commodore Forsberg of the naval militia was told to protect all bridges.

Congress Leaders Approve Wilson. Washington.—Leaders in Congress without regard to politics expressed freely their approval of President Wilson's course and of his address.

Washington.—Precautions to safeguard naval stations, army posts and arsenals, and other service property were military measures taken following the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany. President Wilson conferred briefly after his address to Congress with Secretary Baker and Secretary Daniels. The conference, it was stated, had to do entirely with precautionary steps, although the secretaries also probably gave some general information as to the nation's preparedness for war.

MUSIC ROLLS QUICKLY MADE

Useful Machine Designed Especially
for the Use of Retail Dealers
Recently Put on the Market.

Designed especially for the use of retail dealers, a compact machine that perforates music rolls for use in player pianos is being introduced. The apparatus is described in the Popular Mechanics Magazine. It is capable of making from one to 15 records at a time from sheet music, and will also turn out copies of any standard roll. Its operation is said to be so simple that satisfactory work can be done by persons who are not musicians. The particular advantage of the machine seems to be that it enables a small dealer to fill his customers' orders promptly without having to carry a large, expensive stock. It also obviates the inconveniences that confront patrons when special orders have to be mailed to a factory before their wants can be supplied. Since 16 sheets can be perforated simultaneously, a dealer in making a roll to order has an opportunity to add 15 records to his stock with no expense other than the bare cost of the paper and spools.

BRITISH ENTER TEUTON TRENCHES

RUSSIANS REPULSED IN SERIES
OF CHARGES AGAINST FOES
ON THE RIVER AA.

NIGHT RAID NEAR YPRES

BRITISH KILL MANY TEUTONS
CLAD LIKE KU KLUX KLAN
IN AMERICA.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

With the British Armies in France (via London)—Feb. 6.—The German raiders who made two attacks Thursday morning against the British trenches south of the Ypres salient, looked for all the world like the famous Ku Klux Klan, the Crusaders of reconstruction days in the Southern states of America. They were clad in white sheets fashioned into a sort of smock, wore white hoods and masks, and sought thus to cross the snow-covered No Man's Land without detection. The raiders came over in two waves, only to be hurled back with heavy losses in killed and wounded.

On none of the war fronts has there been any fighting of great moment. The Russians and Germans have continued their operations in several of the sectors near Riga. The Russians admit the penetration of their trenches by the Germans along the Kalnzem road southeast of Riga, but say they were driven back later in a counter attack. Berlin records the repulse of Russian attacks along the Aar river.

Small attacks, mostly by raiding parties, and bombardments continue to prevail on the front in France and Belgium. At several points a surprise attack has given the British and French German trench elements.

Wilson Delivers Address to Congress.

Washington.—There was an unusual attendance of diplomats at the joint session of Congress to hear the President's address announcing a break with Germany. The gravity of the occasion was further pictured by the presence of the justices of the Supreme Court and members of the Cabinet upon the floor. The assemblage burst into applause in which Democrats and Republicans joined when the President declared he had directed the secretary of state to announce "to his excellency, the German ambassador, that all diplomatic relations between the United States and Germany are severed." Louder and more widespread cheering greeted the announcement that the President would come to Congress again to ask authority to "use any means that may be necessary for the protection of our seamen and our people" should "American ships and American lives" be sacrificed in "heedless contravention of the just and reasonable understanding of international law and the obvious dictates of humanity." When the President concluded, Congress again rose and cheered and remained standing while he left the chamber.

President Could Call 18,000,000 Troops
New York.—An army of nearly 18,000,000 men could be called to the colors of the United States if necessary, according to a carefully prepared estimate made public by the executive committee of Mayor Mitchell's committee on national defense. Of this number, 10,535,940 are between the ages of 15 and 45 years and now are physically fit for service in the field, it was said.

CONSCRIPTION URGED BY TAFT.

Former President Believes Army
Should Be Increased, "Now the
War is on Us."

New York.—Conscription to build up an army for the country's defense, "now the war is on us" and for the future as well, was advocated by former President William H. Taft in an address on the League to Enforce Peace before the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences.

"Stirred as the people are by enthusiasm, at the break with Germany, they would support a conscription measure," Mr. Taft believed, "not only to meet the situation, but for the future after the war shall end."

Conscription until now, he said, has been of "doubtful expediency," because popular opposition might have halted all plans for reasonable preparedness. "Now the war is on us, however," he continued, "now that the people see the necessity, why should we not take advantage of this state of public mind and do what justice and real democracy require? Military duty is part of every citizen's duty."

German Captain Gives Up Kaiser.
New York, Feb. 5.—Capt. Julius Guhar, formerly in command of the Vadeland and now in command of the Pennsylvania, of the Hamburg-American line, announced that he desired to become an American citizen. He said he realized this action would mean the forfeiture of his command, but it made no difference to him. He was detained on board his ship, but asserted he would apply to the immigration authorities at Ellis island for permission to take out his citizenship papers.

HERE AND THERE

Speaking of the new road to be built through the Huachuca military reservation, the Tucson Citizen says: "It was only through the reservation that a border highway from Douglas and Bisbee to Nogales could be constructed. With this connecting link built, the counties of Cochise and Santa Cruz, in accordance with assurances given the War Department, will construct first-class roads to make a complete highway between the two points. This highway is of value not only to the military authorities, the cities of Douglas, Bisbee and Nogales, but will be a great convenience to Tucson. It will furnish a better road from Tucson to Fort Huachuca and to the summer resort at Ramsey canyon. Another factor that will make this border highway of value to Arizona is the fact that instead of taking the leisurely tourist over the uninteresting portion of the borderland highway between Bisbee and Tucson, some will go over the border highway through a most beautiful region. Almost the entire route is through rich valleys and wooded hills. The military post is an attraction and the Canelo hills with their great oak trees are beautiful. The view from the top of Canelo pass is an inspiration. The rolling and fertile San Rafael valley will interest the tourist and rarely is a highway built through a more colorful and interesting region than the Harshaw Creek canyon. The drive from Patagonia to Nogales offers beautiful views. Tourists like to visit the border cities, and for that reason Nogales will be interesting to them. The ride north to Tucson over the Sunshine highway through the rich Santa Cruz valley cannot fail to delight travelers, especially as they get a chance to visit the Tumacacori mission ruins and the San Xavier mission on the way. The route offers much to the tourist of interest and scenic beauty, and the travelers will arrive at Tucson with a better conception of Arizona than had they traveled over the borderland route from Bisbee to Tucson with its great stretches of mesa land similar to that encountered on their journey from El Paso to Douglas."

The United States Civil Service Commission announced that on Saturday, February 24, 1917, an examination will be held at Patagonia, Ariz., as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at San Rafael, Ariz., and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interest of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at that place was \$266 for the last fiscal year. Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of examination. Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced. The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at San Rafael or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington at least seven days before the date of the examination; otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.

Apportionment of \$10,000,000 to aid the States in the construction of rural post roads, the second annual distribution in accordance with the federal aid road law, has been announced by Secretary Houston of the Department of Agriculture. The funds are the apportionment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918. To meet the cost of administering the law \$300,000 has been deducted. Allotments to the Western States follow: Arizona, \$137,027; Colorado, \$167,380; New Mexico, \$157,475; Texas, \$583,855. In addition, \$1,000,000 will be apportioned for the development of roads and trails within or partly within the national forests. The law provides that \$15,000,000 shall be apportioned in the fiscal year of 1919; \$20,000,000 in 1920 and \$25,000,000 in 1921.

The dipping of cattle in the tick-infested districts will begin earlier than usual this year, it is announced from Washington. There are now 14,247 vats in commission, and it will be possible with these to dip over a million cattle each month. It is planned to do the work as soon as possible after March 1, in order to catch the first generation of ticks hatched in the spring before they have had time to lay their eggs. In this way it is hoped to release much territory early in the fall. There is reason to believe that 1917 will see more territory freed from the pest than any year since systematic tick eradication

was begun. Each county released from quarantine is an object lesson to its neighbors, and in recent years popular interest in the movement has been growing.

Senator Ray Ferguson of Patagonia has introduced a bill in the State Senate providing for the protection of game birds and game animals, and to provide a safe breeding place and refuge therefor. The game reserve is to be established in a portion of the Huachuca and Patagonia mountains lying in Cochise and Santa Cruz counties. The proposed reserve does not interfere with grazing on the reservation. The bill has been favorably reported upon, and will probably be made a law.

Executive Department, State of Arizona.

In conformity with paragraph 3283 Title XIX, Civil Code, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913, I, Thomas E. Campbell, Governor of Arizona, by virtue of the authority in me vested by law, do hereby proclaim Wednesday, February 14th, 1917, as a legal holiday, the same being the fifth anniversary of the admission of Arizona into the union of States.

And I do earnestly recommend that, in commemoration of this day, all citizens shall unite in exercises which shall be appropriate. Arizona is just entering the most prosperous epoch in her history and it is but fitting that a grateful citizenship take pause and honor the natal day of their state, that their children, and the stranger within their gates, may be inspired with pride, loyalty and devotion for her further moral, physical and spiritual growth in the sisterhood of the United States.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State of Arizona to be affixed.

Done at Phoenix, the capital, this 31st day of January, 1917.

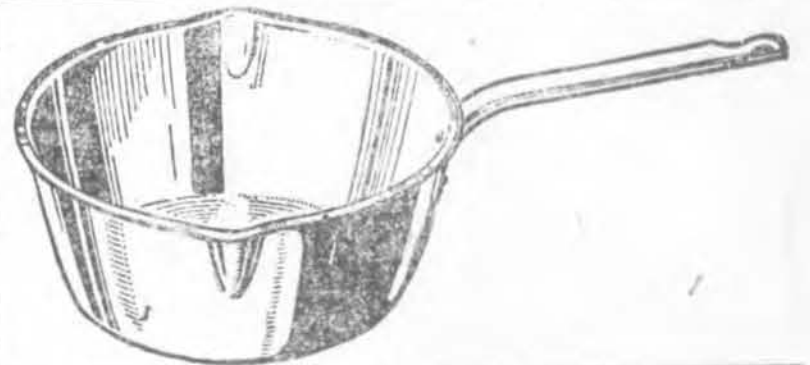
