GOOD ROADS PLAN GIVEN NEW POWER IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, June 10—After a hard fight before the subcommittee of the Resolutions committee of this Republican national convention last night, Governor Thomas E. Campbell of Arizona, who appeared as president of the League of the Southwest and as representing Western governors, secured the adoption of his reclamation plan in the national platform as presented.

The plank follows: "We favor a fixed and comprehensive policy of reclamation to increase national wealth and production. We recognize in the development of reclamation through federal action with its increase of production and taxable wealth a safeguard for the nation.

Governor Campbell also succeeded, after a hard fight, in having inserted in the platform the following addition to the good roads plank:

"In determining the proportion of federal aid for construction among the states the sums lost in taxation to the respective states by the setting apart of large portions of their area as forest reservations shall be considered as a controlling factor."

He is now endeavoring to have this extended by the committee to have this include Indian reservations as well as forest reserves, since a number of the western states, particularly Arizona, have more land tracked up in Indian than in forest reservations.

REVIEW OF RAINFALL

For the benefit of outside engineers we give below the average annual rainfall in Santa Cruz county, as recorded by Col. R. E. Richardson. The rainfall for the past six years, says Col. Richardson, has been a little below normal, averaging only about seventeen inches per annum, but here in the Patagonia district about twenty inches can be counted upon.

EDITORIAL

The capture a few days since in Nogales, Sonora, of two of the three alleged Mexican bandits who held up and robbed Louis Kang and Bep Wo, the Chinese merchants of Patagonia, on the afternoon of May 31, is gratifying news to the citizens of this district. Kang and Wo identified the robbers and state positively that the men under arrest are the guilty parties. After leaving Patagonia the bandits made their way on foot across the Patagonia mountains, arriving on the border at a point about twenty five miles from Patagonia. As the officers suspected, the men soon turned up in Nogales, Sonora, where, with the assistance of Louis Kang, they were spotted last Sunday and placed in jail where they now languish pending the arrival of extradition papers. What has become of the third robber remains a mystery but will doubtless be solved within a very short time. During the battle which was fought between the Mexicans and Patagonia officers a few moments after the robbery it is believed that one of the former was seriously wounded as his two comrades were seen assisting him over the rough places in the mountains. It is to be hoped that speedy justice will be meted out to these outlaws.

The Peoria Enterprise is authority for the statement that farm labor is very much in demand around Peoria and but few men coming in. Untrained workers are receiving from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per day and many women and children are at work in the fields. And this is a reminder of the fact that when work is begun on the public roads in Santa Cruz county that the laborers should receive not less than \$4.50 per day as the minimum wage. This will be an inducement for the better class of men to apply for work and this is the only way to obtain first class service. Get good men and pay them good wages should be the slogan.

A howl of protest is going up from Maricopa county over the deplorable condition of the public roads, and the citizens are looking for a Moses who can lead them out of the rut wherein they have fallen. They are getting tired of political stuff and want candidates who will pledge themselves to work for better roads. If good roads are evidences of civilization where do the people of Maricopa county stand? Let the citizens of Santa Cruz county take due notice and vote for the bond issue when it comes up.

 PHOENIX, June 11—Picking the roughest, meanest, and toughest portion of the Borderland route leading southwest from Tucson to the Mexican border, the State Highway department forces started work last year at the summit 21 miles south of Vail. Inch by inch, yard by yard, mile by mile, they forced their way northward, converting a twisted mountain road into a broad sweeping thoroughfare with a maximum grade of six per cent, and then—the funds gave out.

When the Pima County Highway commission saw the high character of the work, and realized the importance of the route, it was decided then and there to devote \$182,000 from the county bond issue to complete the job from the Santa Cruz county line into Vail. To do this, the entire engineering and working forces of the State Highway department, which were at work at that point, were taken over by the county, incidentally affording as splendid an example of highway cooperation between state and county as could be found anywhere in Arizona.

This construction is now in progress under the general direction of L. E. Barker, county highway engineer for Pima county. A. W. Jenkins whose engineering experience in Arizona covers a period of 30 years is managing the job. He is being aided by G. B. Little, assistant engineer, and J. R. Chadwick, foreman of a force of men which is regarded as one of the finest bunches of road builders in Arizona.

To keep track of the cost, Pima county has placed an auditor in the camp, C. H. Weaver being named for this responsible position.

Under the agreement between Pima county and the state highway department, the latter has undertaken to do the work at cost plus \$10, the \$10 being added to meet certain legal requirements and to secure the use of \$75,000 worth of state equipment.

This equipment is a portion of the \$1,500,000 worth of caterpillars, trucks and other highway machinery and supplies turned over to Arizona by the federal bureau of public roads in the allotment of surplus war materials. The equipment included also several tons of TNT and blasting caps. The explosives were delayed, however. Had

it been received when first promised by the government, that saving would have been \$10,000. Eight and a half miles of the toughest construction are now finished, and the forces are still working toward Vail. From Vail to Tucson, the road is in first class condition, except for some short curves whose alteration will not be very expensive.

The new road will be used extensively by mining interests operating out of Vail. Further south it passes through what is conceded to be the richest cattle grazing land in the state, that in the vicinity of Empire ranch. Further south it passes through a country which is undergoing a remarkable transition from grazing to dry farming. This section is destined to become one of the most prosperous agricultural districts in the state.

SYNDICATE TO RE-OPEN OLD SILVER MINE IN SONORA

Preliminary work is under way for unwatering the old Providencia silver mine in Sonora which adjoins the famous Sultana mine. The initial machinery for getting water out of the Providencia has been completed under the direction of W. R. Beatty, construction mining engineer from Elgin, Ariz., and formerly chief engineer for the Morning Glory mine at Patagonia. He was in Nogales Tuesday for a conference with W. R. Ramsdell of Tucson, president of the corporation which is working on the Providencia mine.

Mining Men Numerous
 "The Sonora district is filled with mining men from the States who are getting ready to begin heavy producing from mines there soon," said Mr. Beatty. "Much preliminary development and installation work is under way. The country is quiet and orderly, the people being satisfied with the new government."

"The machinery I have been installing is the hoist to be used in getting the water out of the mine. This mine has not been worked for 40 years. It is rich in silver and I understand the plan is, after the water is out and an inspection made if results justify the outlay, to put in additional machinery for quantity production."

The man was killed by being chopped on the head with a hatchet while in bed asleep. His wife was attacked while in the kitchen. She is said to have been beaten over the head with a miner's single jack hammer. Though well-nigh unconscious from her terrible wounds, the aged woman crawled to the bed on which her husband lay and stretched herself beside his lifeless form.

His son, a lieutenant in the Phoenix fire department, found his parents on the bed when he returned from the station for breakfast at an early morning hour.

This killing is reported by the Phoenix police as the most fiendish crime of its kind in the history of the state. The house had been ransacked from top to bottom by the murderers in their search for loot.

HARDY TO MAKE RACE FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL

Leslie V. He telegraphed today to Collector of the Port Charles E. Hardy advising him of the announcement. The telegram from Tucson follows:

"I announced my candidacy today for nomination as attorney general. The situation looks excellent here."

Thus far this means that County Attorney Hardy will oppose Wiley E. Jones, present attorney general of Arizona, for the Democratic nomination.

SANTA CRUZ VOTERS ENDORSE CAMPBELL FOR VICE-PRESIDENT

Governor Campbell as vice-presidential candidate on the Republican ticket was heartily endorsed Saturday night by the Republican voters of Santa Cruz county at an enthusiastic meeting in the Army and Navy Union hall. The resolution of endorsement, was telegraphed to National Committeeman A. B. Jaynes of Tucson and S. F. Noon, convention delegate from Nogales.

The Republican meeting was called late Saturday after telegraphic notice received by The Herald from Chicago that a boom for the nomination as vice-president had been started in pre-convention talk there for the Arizona governor and that Mr. Campbell is being backed for second place at the head of the national ticket by influential Pacific coast papers.

So far as known the action by the Santa Cruz county voters is the first taken in the United States by any body of organized Republicans in officially endorsing a candidate for the vice-presidency.

The initial action in starting the movement which ended in the naming of the Battleship Arizona was taken by Santa Cruz county citizens in 1915.
