# CAMERON DEFEATS CLARK; SIMMS, SMITH, EARHART WIN NOMINATION

## FRESH SHOCKS DELAY RESCUE WORK IN ITALY EARTHQUAKES

(BULLETIN)  
ROME, Sept. 9.—Another violent earthquake occurred today in the Campania district at 2:35 a. m. causing great loss of lives and an amount of important damage. The communities suffering most are Reggio, Ospedaletti, Bussana, Toano, Cavola. The shock was more violent than that on Tuesday.

ROME, Sept. 9.—Over 300 persons perished in the earthquake which shattered the cities and villages north of Florence, Tuesday. Relief work is being done under great difficulty in the ruined mountain towns.

New shocks, but none of them of the intensity of the one which caused deaths and widespread destruction early Tuesday, have since been felt in Florence and the surrounding country. The new shocks have shaken down many tottering structures and delayed the work of rescuers. Massacrara, in the center of the earthquake zone, has been cut off from communication with the outside but it is not believed a new catastrophe has occurred.

**KING VIEWS RUINS**  
FIVAZZINO, Italy, Sept. 9.—(By courier to Florence)—King Victor Emmanuel of Italy today viewed the ruins caused in this city by the earthquake. The king went into every quarter of the town and entered a building whose crumbling walls threatened to fall if another tremor should come. He talked with survivors, expressing profound grief.

**60 TOWNS WRECKED**  
FLORENCE, Italy, Sept. 9.—The number of dead from Tuesday's earthquake is steadily growing. The latest advices from Fivazzano bring the total of dead there alone up to 432 while in Vignattoli 124 are dead and 1,000 injured. In nearly three-score towns and villages serious damage was done and a total population of more than 10,000 was rendered homeless.

## WORST QUAKE IN YEARS FELT TODAY IN CALIFORNIA

SAN JOSE, Calif., Sept. 9.—The heaviest earthquake in years was felt here today at 8:57 a. m. No report of the damage has been received.

**FINE FRUIT**  
Pete Bergier whose ranch is situated about four miles from Patagonia was in town Friday and left at the Patagonia office one dozen peaches and three apples which would compare very favorably with the California products. Mr. Bergier did not know what varieties they were, but the peaches resembled the Elbertas but were larger than any Elberta we have ever seen. They were golden yellow with a tinge of red running through them, perfectly round, juicy and fine flavored. Several parties who sampled them were astonished in learning that they were grown here. Mr. Bergier says that in former years he raised them larger than these, the rainfall having been a little below normal this year. The apples were large and well flavored and were far superior to the apples being shipped in here. The sight of this splendid fruit is encouraging and ought to prove an incentive to other farmers and stockmen to plant fruit trees this fall.

**GETS STUCK IN MUD**  
During the heavy rains which fell in this section last Sunday Maj. McDonald, enroute from Nogales to Elgin, attempted to cross a swollen stream four miles west of Patagonia with the result that his car got stuck in the quick sands and he was compelled to walk into town and get a truck to go back and pull his car out. The car was not injured and the major continued his journey.

**HEAVY RAIN**  
What was probably the heaviest rains of the season fell last Sunday in Patagonia and surrounding country. The clouds first formed over Baldy in the Santa Rita mountains and brought a heavy down pour; afterwards several other hard rains came from the San Rafael country, amounting to almost a cloudburst. All of the creeks and ravines were filled with water delaying traffic for a period of several hours. The main business street of Patagonia was badly washed out and the water spread out over a large portion of the west end of town.

PHOENIX, Sept. 9.—Further returns today did not change the standing of the candidates in Tuesday's primaries, leaving Ralph Cameron of Phoenix leading over E. S. Clark of Prescott for the Republican senatorial nomination. Senator Smith of Tucson is leading A. A. Worsley for the Democratic senatorial nomination. Mitt Simms of Phoenix is leading by a wide margin for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Ralph Cameron overcame the lead of E. S. Clark for the Republican nomination of United States senator and has forged ahead about 500 votes which is considered a safe majority.

Locally, H. J. Patterson has clinched the nomination for sheriff and A. A. Trippell has been nominated for county attorney.

It is safe to predict that R. R. Earhart will receive the Democratic nomination for state treasurer over Sam Webb. While the race is close, Earhart is maintaining his lead and gaining ground.

The following is a resume of state wide results and county returns:

### STATEWIDE RESULTS

**U. S. SENATOR**  
Stanford has conceded the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator to Smith. The veteran senator will win by a majority of 1500.

In the Republican race it is nip and tuck with Cameron and Clark. Reports at noon stated that Cameron was about 200 in the lead. Cameron will no doubt receive the nomination.

**GOVERNOR**  
Simms has moved Winsor under in many sections of the state. Simms is nominated by a large plurality.

**STATE TREASURER**  
The race between Earhart and Webb is close and exciting with Earhart favored and who will doubtless get the nomination. Webb has not conceded victory to the Santa Cruz county man.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL**  
Jones has between 400 and 500 votes more than Hardy who is second in the race. It is hardly possible that Hardy can overcome Jones' lead. Hardy stated today his chances for the nomination on the face of the returns were slim.

**SECRETARY OF STATE**  
Ross still leads for the Democratic nomination for secretary of state. This race is close and official tabulation may be necessary to ascertain the winner.

**SUPREME COURT**  
McAllister will carry off the nomination with Pattee second. McAllister is gaining ground on incoming returns.

**CORPORATION COMMISSIONER**  
The race for corporation commissioner lies between Adams and Cashel with Cashel favored. Adams is piling up a heavy vote in the southern section of the state, while Cashel is carrying the central and north.

**TAX COMMISSION**  
Luke and Zander will be the nominees for this position, according to advices received at this office.

**MINE INSPECTOR**  
The present incumbent, Bolls, will no doubt be re-nominated with Massey running second.

On the Republican side the race is very close between White and Mellgren and final count may be necessary to determine.

**PUBLIC INSTRUCTION**  
C. O. Case and Peterson are running neck and neck for the nomination. Tucson stated at noon Peterson had a slight lead. Phoenix stated that Case was in the lead.

# SHOCKS COVER 100 MILES; HIT MANY LARGE TOWNS

ROME, Sept. 8.—Several hundred persons lost their lives in the earthquake at Fivizzano and many more were injured according to a dispatch to the Tribuna from Massau.

Scores of lives are also believed to be lost in the district north of Florence which was shaken by an earthquake yesterday morning.

As reports from the stricken region come in over the faltering telegraph and telephone lines, the extent of the disaster seems to be growing. The possibility is that damage done may be much more serious than first believed.

The territory most violently disturbed seems to be of oblong shape with Florence at the southern apex and Modena at the northern end. It extends to the Etrurian coast, runs over the Apennines and eastward for upwards of 100 miles. In this district are many populous towns.

# 7 DIE AT U. S. ARSENAL FROM DRINKING BAD ALCOHOL

BALTIMORE, Sept. 8.—The list of fatalities among the civilian employees at the Edgewood arsenal, resulting from drinking some form of poisoned alcohol, was increased today to seven by the deaths of Nelson Lucius, Rochester, N. Y., and James Davis, Salisbury, Md. The military authorities at Edgewood say they are unable to ascertain where the liquor comes from owing to the refusal of the survivors to tell where they got it.

# GREATEST CORN CROP PREDICTED BY U. S. THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Corn prospects improved during August and promised on September 1 a crop of 3,131,000,000 bushels, the department of agriculture today announced.

This is 139,000,000 bushels more than was indicated on August 1 and is 6,000,000 bushels above the largest previous crop of record in 1912. It is over 200,000,000 above the crop of last year and almost 400,000,000 bushels above the past five years' average.

# Woman, 92, Will Vote For Harding For Her 1st. Ballot

SALEM, Mass., Sept. 8.—A Salem woman who has been interested in the "votes for women" question for three score years and who has announced she intends to vote for Senator Warren G. Harding for president, is Mrs. Almira C. Griswold, aged 92 years. She was easily the oldest woman registered among the nearly 1000 women of this city who had their names placed on the voting lists this last week.

She asserts women should vote for the party which made her vote possible. This she believes to be the best use of her first ballot.

Mrs. Griswold has been an advocate of woman suffrage since Civil war times and attended a bazaar held in the interests of pushing the equal suffrage cause away back in 1869 in Boston. All these years Mrs. Griswold has been interested in the campaign that has been waged by Susan B. Anthony and her followers.

While Mrs. Griswold is not so much interested in local politics, yet she believes the women can and will vote just as intelligently and more so than the men. Asked if she believed women as capable of holding office as the men she answered quickly, "Yes, I believe women office holders would be fully as capable as the men."

Salem's oldest woman voter is in fine health, eats and sleeps well and does not require more than eight hours' rest a day. She busies herself sewing or reading, but does not go out of doors much because of an injury sustained some years ago.

# COLORADO POPULATION INCREASES 16.6 PERCENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 3.—The census of the State of Colorado is 929,376, an increase of 140,325, or 17.6 percent. The Denver census as revised gives 256,491, an increase of 43,110, or 20.2 percent.

# CATTLEMEN VISITORS GIVEN 10-DAY BORDER CARDS WITHOUT CHARGE

DOUGLAS, Sept. 3.—Ten-day permit cards are being issued by Immigration Officer Frank W. Heath to visiting cattlemen of the Cochise Graham cattlemen's convention in Douglas meeting here today and tomorrow. Although the cattlemen will meet in Douglas two days the 10-day permits are being issued in order to eliminate any inconvenience to members.

# OPEN LETTER

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Santa Cruz County.

We, the undersigned citizens of Santa Cruz County, Arizona, beg to advise that an amount of over 100 per cent. advance in the cost of the necessities of life, that it is vitally important to the welfare of our people that a higher standard of wages be paid to those who engage in county road work, and we believe it will be to the best interests of the County to pay those who are thus employed by the County at least 50 per cent. more than the present scale, in order that they may be able to meet the ever increasing cost of living.

We therefore petition the Honorable Board of Supervisors to fix a minimum of not less than the sum of four dollars and fifty cents a day as the minimum wage of the laborers of all road work in the said Santa Cruz County.

And it is further advised that all contractors for road work be notified of this minimum wage scale before they put in their bids.

It is further desired to call attention to Art. 18, and Section 10, of the Constitution of Arizona, which reads in part as follows:

"No person not a citizen or ward of the United States, or who has not declared his intention to become a citizen, shall be employed upon, or in connection with, any State, county or municipal works, or employment; Provided, that nothing herein shall be construed to prevent the working of prisoners by the State, or by any municipality thereof, on street or road work, or other public work."

(The above petition, with a long list of names attached thereto, has been forwarded from Patagonia to the secretary of the Board of Supervisors at Nogales, and it is expected that the board will take favorable action in the matter.)
