

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



RATTI IS ELECTED MONEY TO BE RAISED

CONGRESS DISCUSSES WAYS OF RAISING CASH TO PAY SOL-DIER BONUS.

Weshinton.-The field of possible soldiers' bonus taxes has been narrowed to eight sources by the subcommittee of the Republican members of the House ways and means committee dealing with the tax problem,

These sources were stated as follows: A gasoline consumption tax of possibly 1 cent a gallon; a license fax on automobiles of about 25 cents per horsepower; a stamp tax on bank checks at about I cent for each check; tax on real estate fransfers at the rate of about 5 cents on each \$10 involved, and increased taxes on admisdons where the sum paid exceeds 25 cents; cigarettes, tobacco and docunentary stances.

Representative Longworth of Ohio, acting chairman of the subcommittee, in the absence of Representative Fordney, said there was fittle sentiment for any increase either in the first-class or second-class postage rates, but added that there had been some discussion of an advance in the pureel post rates.

In the House Representative Perlara, Republican, New York, has introduced t bill proposing a general increase in the inheritance inx, designed to yield an additional \$300,000,000 at year in revenue. He said this would go a long way toward paying the hours.

The bonus taxes will be temporary, Mr. Longworth said, extending over three years, and will be designed solely to take cure of the cash payments to be made during the two and one-half years beginning Jan. 1, 1928. 





OLD CITY ON TEMPLE SITE American Archeologists Have Con-

vinced Themselves of Facts Concerning Ancient Sardis.

Doctor Hogarth, keeper of the Ashmolean museum in Oxford, recently gave a series of lectures on the excavations conducted by American archeologists at Sardis. About fifty Latin inscriptions were discovered in the temple rulns by the Americans, Most of the inscriptions were found, however, on the lower slopes of the mountaln'at the rear of the temple.

The object of the undertaking was to settle the question as to whether the temple columns stood on the site of the ancient Sardis or whether it had disappeared with the collapse of the acropolis. The archeologists satisfled themselves that the ancient town did stand on the temple site. The theory is that the temple was built originally in the Fourth century; indeed, one of the inscriptions discovered dates back to the time of Antigonous, or about 300 B. C. Traces have also been found of an earlier sandstone temple under the other fragments. Originally the temple had eight columns in each of the two facades; not many architects today would design a building to support such great weight on such supports. The work of excavation was greatly facilitated by the importation of a whole railroad from the United States.

322,000 Grains From One.

An experiment to show the fecundity of a grain of wheat has just been concluded at the official school of agriculture, Vallodolid, Spain, with the result that one grain produced in a year 322,-000 grains.

At the end of July 100 grains were sown separately. At the end of September the grains had developed an average of 12 shoots each. These were cut and transplanted and by the end of October each cutting furnished an average of eight shoots, which produced 65 ears each, and each ear gave un average of 50 grains. A simple multiplication sum shows that each of the original grains planted reproduced itself 12x8x65x50, making a total of 322,000 grains.
