Cast Iron is brittle and hard, like the Hd on the kitchen range. Wrought iron can be hammered out flat or made into wire or welded. It is quite soft. Steel is also capable of being hammered out flat and welded. Its peculiar property is that when tempered it be-

omes very hard-so hard that a sharp edge can be put on it-so hard that it will, when edged, cut wrought Iron. Iron which has been melted and poured into a mold in some form desired for use, such as part of a stove, is called cast iron. STOPS WORK ON BIG SHIPS

ward the work. Refore Mr. Harding made his address the five treatles agreed upon by the conference were formally signed, ent: and when the President concluded That Ford will pay \$5,000,000 Secretary of State Hughes declared the conference adjourned sine die.

Now it is up to the United States menate to put the stamp of approval on the work accomplished by the conference. President Harding Indicated that he would transmit to it without delay the treaties, and the steering committee of the senate, which met with him Tuesday evening, promised that they should have the right of way until the tariff bill is reported. The debate probably will be prolonged, but there seems little reason to doubt that the treaties will be ratified.

The first tangible results of the conference appeared Wednesday, when Secretary of the Navy Denby, under direction of the President, ordered the suspension of work on eight battleships and six battle cruisers now under construction, pending final action on the naval treaty. When the treaty has been ratified the contracts for the ships will be canceled. The building operations stopped by Secretary Denby's order have been costing the government about \$5,000,000 a month. Of the eight battleships, one will be completed later-either the West Virginia or the Washington. The Colorado, which is almost completed and is not included in the list, also will be fin-Ished. Two of the battle cruisers are to be completed as airplane carriers.





Laber Shortage Hit Gold Mining.

Twenty-five gold lode mines were operated in Mlaska in 1918, according to the United States geological survey, department of the interior. There was also a production of seven prospects-abandoned mines or small mines that were not in regular operation. The value of the gold lode output decreased from \$4,581,453 in 1917 to \$3,473,317 in 1918, owing partly to the disaster at the Trendwell mine in April, 1917, and partly to curtailment of operations, especially in the Juneau district, because of shortage of labor.-Seattle Post-Intelligencer.




