NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Railway Shopmen Taking Strike Vote Because Their Pay Is Cut \$60,000,000.

WALKOUT MAY BE AVOIDED

Supreme Court Deals Organized Labor Severe Blow—France's Refusal to Reduce Reparations Blocks German Loan Plans—Radical Republicans Win Victory in Iowa Primary Election.

ABOUT \$80,000,000 having been lopped off their yearly pay by the federal railway labor board, the railroad shopmen are taking a vote returnable on June 30, on the question of accepting the reduction or going on strike.

Thus, apparently, the country faces a strike, probably effective in the middle of July, that might come near to tying up its rail transportation. But there is hope that it will not eventuate. An affirmative strike vote and an actual strike are different things, and the vote is but seldom used only as a weapon in the hands of union officials in negotiating. Railroad executives profess to believe that the men will not even vote to strike.

Unless it is nullified by congressional legislation, this decision of the highest court in the land will powerfully and widely affect the future relations of union organizations with employers and with the general public.

Members of the reparations commission voted to enlarge the international committee of bankers that was trying to adjust Germany's financial affairs and to permit it to make its own inquiry into Germany's capacity to pay, ignoring the London schedule.

The bankers, recognizing that unanimity does not exist among the nations that would be expected to participate in the immense loans they were planning for Germany, decided to give up all idea of an international loan, and so reported to the reparations commission.

On the other hand, B. M. Jewell, head of the railroad employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, says: "The new wages do not permit a minimum living wage, and they are wholly at variance with the saving wage championed by President Harding and Secretary of Labor Davis."

UNION labor received what it considers another body blow last week in the decision of the United States Supreme court in the Colorado coal mine case.

SOVIET Russia, having failed to frighten the rest of the world into giving it large credits, has resumed his old uncompromising attitude.

Z. Z. Dodds, for a number of years secretary of the board of school trustees of Douglas, Ariz., has resigned his position and will leave soon for Welland, Ontario, Canada.

George Fratlek, 18, doomed to die for the murder of Walter Layton, guard at the State Industrial School at Phoenix, will not be hanged June 16.

Plans are being made to hold the next meeting of the Colorado River Commission on Aug. 1 at Bishop's Lodge, a resort near Santa Fe, N. M.

Lewis Hawes of Portales, charged with the murder of his son, Alvin Hawes, and his son's wife, Mrs. Alvin Hawes, entered a plea of guilty of first degree murder, and was sentenced to serve ninety years on each count in the state penitentiary.

LIQUOR SOLD ON U. S. SHIPS

LASKER REFUSES TO HALT LIQUOR SALES ON AMERICAN VESSELS.

SALES WILL CONTINUE

ATTACKS ON SHIPPING BOARD BY CONGRESS AND DRY FORCES LOOM.

(Western Newspaper Union News Service.)

Washington.—Sale of liquor on shipping board vessels at sea will be continued, Chairman Lasker reiterated here, until a separate decision has been rendered holding such practice illegal under the prohibition laws.

Mr. Lasker maintained the position taken by him in his letter to Adolphus Buseh, III, vice president of the Anheuser-Busch Brewery Company, St. Louis, despite indication that it would be made the subject of attack in Congress and by dry organizations.

Officials of the Department of Justice refused to comment on the situation, but in some quarters attention was called to an opinion on file there which was rendered by former Acting Attorney General Frierson in 1920.

According to high department officials a decision of an attorney general retains the official interpretation of a law until it has been revoked by court decision or by a superseding opinion.

Mr. Lasker's stand as to liquor sales on board American vessels was taken, he informed Mr. Buseh, on the authority of an opinion rendered by General Counsel Schlesinger of the shipping board.

The chairman conferred with Attorney General Daugherty and while there gave him copies of the correspondence with the St. Louis brewer.

Refusing to discuss his talk with Mr. Daugherty, Chairman Lasker declared he would not ask the department for a new opinion, being entirely satisfied with that rendered by Mr. Schlesinger.

While there was no indication that there would be any move by an executive department in the matter, at the capitol the Busch-Lasker correspondence provoked considerable discussion among prohibition leaders.

Neither the Gallivan speech nor publication of the Busch correspondence gave legislative leaders their first knowledge of liquor selling at sea, however.

Conferences May End Coal Strike.

Cincinnati, Ohio.—That a movement has been under way for some time among coal operators of the central competitive field to come together in conference with the miners looking to a settlement of the national coal strike, was admitted here by William Green, secretary of the United Mine Workers.

1,300 Casualties in Tientsin Battle.

London.—A dispatch from Peking says in fighting near Shandukwan, northeast Tientsin, 1,300 troops had 300 casualties.

Miners Refuse Wage Arbitration.

New York.—With the refusal of miners representatives on the wage scale conference to accept arbitration, the anti-trust operators representative body refused to proceed further in the negotiations.

10,000 Naval Employees Must Go.

Washington.—Approximately 10,000 employees of the national navy yards will be let out during the next fiscal year as a result of the continued apportionment in the public naval bill as submitted to the House available for this year.

NOVEL PLAN DEVELOPED IN GREENLEE COUNTY

Stores at Morenci have worked out a co-operative plan through the Greenlee county agricultural agent and the County Farm Bureau whereby the normal supply of meat, figured at 15,000 pounds per week, will be supplied from local ranches and finished ready for the block by the grain farmers. The contract plan is for local cattlemen to turn over their range stuff to the farmers, who will feed them for a period of not to exceed eight weeks. The stores will have a lien upon the cattle during this feeding period in order that the farmer may be paid weekly for the feed he is putting into the cattle on a basis of \$54 for the average steer. The first week the farmer will receive 6 per cent of the price of the steer for his labor and feed. This price is reduced from week to week until on the eighth week he receives only 2 per cent. This plan gives to the farmer grain feeding each animal 36 per cent, or \$19.44.

The cattle will be placed on feed in such numbers as to make a regular supply of grain-fed beef to supply the mining camps. It also affords a possible market for the second grade hay and other crops which do not have a market value. Arrangements are being made through the Bank of Nogales for financing this plan. In addition to cattle, as above described, veal, lamb, mutton and pork also will be supplied. This is a splendid example of the possibilities coming from the co-operative efforts being developed through the activities of the Farm Bureau and the Industrial Congress in Arizona. In this case, corporations, banks, stockmen and farmers are all uniting in the proposed plan of finishing meat ready for the market at home, instead of shipping cattle to an eastern market and returning refrigerated meat. This plan can be adopted by Santa Cruz county farmers, and would make money for farmers and merchants as well, as it would give the grower of crops an opportunity to dispose of his produce and save the freight on eastern finished meat.

WESTERN METALS ADVANCING

Lead quotations have reached new high peaks at 5.43 cents a pound for western metal in the New York market. A strong feature in the lead situation, however, is the continued unsettledness of Spanish labor troubles and paucity of Australian shipments to outside markets. It is reported that Belgian smelters have contracted for 450,000 tons of Australian zinc concentrates to be delivered over the next three years.

Copper metal has advanced nearly a cent a pound in the New York market. Copper is still higher quotationally, the producers' combine holding out for 13 3/4 cents a pound on electrolytic. Semi-fabricated copper goods, wire, rods, etc., have been marked up sharply from 1 1/2 to 2 cents a pound within the last week. American copper exports for the first 23 days of May are at the rate of 49,000,000 pounds for the month.

Breakfast and Its Relation to Health

(By HELEN BARR)

There is very little danger of eating too much of a well-balanced diet. There is great danger of eating too much of a poorly-balanced diet. If children have all they want to eat isn't that enough attention to give to their food?

No. Every child needs a certain variety and amount of growing material. The diet must be well balanced in order to insure enough of each one without getting too much of others.

What is a well-balanced diet? A well-balanced diet supplies all the needs of the body in practically the amounts needed for each day's process of living. How can we be sure of a well-balanced diet? A well-balanced diet may be obtained by observing the following suggestions: Spend no more for meat than for milk (using at least one-half quart of milk for every child under 16 and one-third of a quart for every adult). Spend as much or more for vegetables and fruit as for meat. Use plenty of vegetables. Eat freely of cereals and bread to satisfy the appetite (use the whole grain cereals).

Summary Use all the milk the family needs. Use vegetables for at least one meal a day. Use plenty of potatoes and some leaf or green vegetables, besides, each day. Have some fruit at least five times a week. Dried fruit may be used frequently if preferred, with fresh fruit at least twice a week. Reduce the meat expenditure to provide for the milk if necessary. Let the children have as much coarse cereal and bread as they want at meal time. Fat may be in the form of butter or a butter substitute. Avoid too much sweets and jam. They satisfy the appetite before all the growing material needed has been eaten. Avoid tea and coffee. Dollars well spent for food spell health.

MONKEY SPRINGS TO BE MADE INTO BETTER SWIMMING POOL

Monkey Springs pool is being widened and deepened, dressing rooms are to be erected, board walks built, and other improvements made that will place that resort at the head of the column as far as swimming places are concerned. The lower pool, which now is 20x25 feet, will be enlarged to 75x200 feet. It will be deepened and cleaned of rubbish, weeds and other objectionable impediments to swimmers, and will be the most popular resort in Santa Cruz County when completed.

A number of local people have formed themselves into an organization, known as the Monkey Springs Improvement Association. Donations will be asked for from those who frequent the springs to defray the expense of improvements. Mr. O. F. Ashburn, at whose ranch the springs are located, has very generously given the use of the swimming pool free of charge to the residents of the county, and will allow them to put in whatever improvements are necessary for the comfort and convenience of its patrons.

To assist in raising funds to help defray the cost of the improvements at the "swimming hole," there will be a benefit dance at the Patagonia Opera House the night of July 1. The dance arrangements are in charge of Pat Patterson and Woodie Allen. Good music is promised and lunch will be served during the evening.

H. H. McCutchan has the contract to enlarge the pool and clean it, which work will be completed within a few days.

SPECIAL FEATURES OF PREMIUMS OFFERED AT STATE FAIR

Five hundred dollars in special premiums are being offered by the Arizona State Fair management for exhibits from members of the National Boys' and Girls' Clubs in Arizona. Special features will be the prizes of \$50 to the championship team and \$25 to the boys' livestock judging team outside of Maricopa county. This money is to be used by these teams in defraying their expenses to the State Fair, where they will compete with the championship teams in Maricopa county for state honors. Additional cash prizes are also to be awarded to those winning first place. Exhibits from all of the Boys' and Girls' clubs in Arizona receive recognition in the premium list which is now being prepared. Prizes have been increased so that no trophy are comparable in value to those offered by any of the state fairs in the country. In addition to this, the Durac-Jersey Bessemer Association, Boys' and Girls' Club leader and the Holstein-Friesian Association of America are offering special premiums which will interest all of the club members.

IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE.

LAND BANKS ARE CHARTERED

A comprehensive plan for the financing of the farmers of the entire territory west of the Rockies was announced recently following the filing with the Federal Farm Loan board at Washington of applications for charters for four joint stock land banks. These banks will have a total initial lending power of \$16,800,000, and will serve the farmers of California, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah, comprising in general the territory of the Twelfth Federal Reserve district, with the exception of Nevada.

Under the provisions of the Federal Farm Loan act, each of the five banks to be chartered may loan to farmers on carefully regulated appraisements, not to exceed 50 per cent of the value of their land, and up to 20 per cent of the value of the insured permanent improvements. Money may be borrowed to pay off existing loans or as part of the purchase price of land, for improvements or other purposes, joint stock land banks not being restricted in this respect. Loans are repayable on the amortization plan, by which annual installments cover interest and part of the principal, so the whole loan is paid in not less than five nor more than forty years.

Vice President Charles H. Toll of the Security Trust and Savings Bank of Los Angeles said: "The creation of this system means creating a reservoir of money at low interest rate for all legitimate agricultural operations in the whole Twelfth Federal Reserve district. Few individual loaners or banks can or would loan money on forty years' time, or on the amortization plan, which has proven so practical with land banks. But through these land banks the farmer with a high interest, short time mortgage is able to replace it with a loan at lower interest which he can dispose of in easy annual installments. The land banks, too, will provide money for part of the original purchase of lands, and thus greatly facilitate irrigation development and the sub-division and sale of large tracts to settlers."

### ENDED DREAM OF WEALTH

**Humorous Side to Alchemy Fiasco

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### RESTORING "DEAD" TO LIFE

**Remarkable Effects of Substance  
Which the Medical Fraternity  
Knows as Adrenalin.**

Within the last few months quite a number of cases have been reported of persons, who were to all intents and purposes dead, being restored to life. The instance which occurred in Yorkshire, when a woman, said by her doctor to be dead, showed signs of returning life within a quarter of an hour, is a case in point, writes the medical correspondent of London Times.

There was also the case of a child, eleven months old, who apparently died while undergoing an operation, and could not be revived even by massage of the heart. The little one's body had actually become cold when the doctor made an injection of a substance called adrenalin.

The result of this treatment on the child's heart, which had ceased to beat for four minutes, was that it immediately began to beat again and the patient made a perfect recovery.

There is also on record the sudden dropping dead of a woman of thirty; in other words, she would have been left for dead by the ordinary practitioner, for she was pulseless, her heart had stopped beating, her jaws were set and her eyes glazed. Fortunately she was seen by a doctor who had had experience in the use of adrenalin. He injected a dose and soon the woman was sitting up and talking to her friends.

In cases where there is no disease or damage of any of the vital bodily organs, restoration to life is quite possible if the appropriate remedy can be applied in good time.

### DATES FROM SIXTH CENTURY

**Oldest Known Latin Extant Is Not  
Epigram, but Decidedly Com-  
monplace in Expression.**

Those who swear by the classics, and believe that in them is set down all wisdom, as well as those who flour this view for old-fashionedness, may be surprised to learn that the oldest known Latin extant, dating, according to most scholars, as early as the Sixth century, B. C., is neither a fragment of an old law carved in crumbling stones nor a scrap of old parchment containing a calendar proclamation.

Instead it appears on so frivolous a thing as a piece of jewelry, a gold brooch, and that not made for a woman, but meant to be worn by a Roman patrician to fasten the folds of his toga at the shoulder. The motto on the piece is nothing but that could be carved on a commonplace cornerstone, nor is it suitable for printing on a state seal. It is only a journeyman jeweler's mark, and may be translated "Manius Made Me for Numerius!"—From the New York Sun.

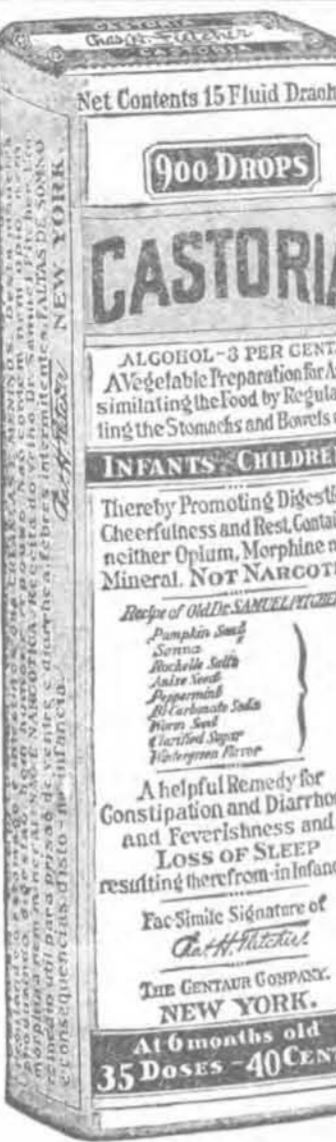

Offerings of food, hair and other small articles are often placed in the trunks of certain trees, and have a quaint significance. As the markets of these offerings are poor Moors with large families, they firmly believe that Allah will be pleased and will give them means to support their families. Some Moors declare that, after this offering, their children eat less, and, therefore, cost less to keep.

At another religious celebration spiked balls are thrown into the air and allowed to fall on the "thrower's" legs. The man who appears the most injured and ferocious is considered the most truly religious.

Moorish marriages are performed at twilight, and the bride is confined to her room for several days after the ceremony. No Moorish woman who is truly religious is seen in the streets at any time, except in cases of absolute necessity. Life is indeed different from that in Europe.
