## Sense of Smell Guides Insects

Scientists Say Olfactory Powers of Bees and Ants Are Past Comprehension.

Diears Up Some of the Mysteries That Have Puzzled Scientists for Centuries-Makes Experiment With Moths.

Washington.-Did you ever imagine what the world resembles to a bee or an ant? Putting yourself in an nsect's place is not just a matter of sicturing your normal self reduced a million or so times and walking about seeing crumbs as toaves of bread and tumps in the carpet as mountains.

If you fancy yourself a worker in the bee world, for example, you must magine yourself recognizing hive seighbors by their distinctive odor.

When you returned home after a ong journey in search of nectar the sentinel at the door would know you by the odor of the hive which you mrried. If by some mishap you berame lost or injured and did not re turn to the hive for several days the live odor would gradually become faint and when you arrived the ruardian of the door would sound the warning that a stranger was trying to break in. The result would be a tragic ending of your useful career.

As a honey bee you would have ntense passion for sweet things, and if a scienist got you in his power and put you to work in his experiments you would show him that a bee cannot be fooled by bitter salts in candy. You would be a connoisseur to the exient of recognizing the difference between candy containing strychnine and candy containing quinine when the scientist himself could not detect any difference in taste.

These random glimpses of life in an insect's world are gathered from the experiments of Dr. N. E. McIndoo of the bureau of entomology. Doctor McIndoo recently has published a paper on the senses of insects in which he explains his latest observations and conclusions, especially those relating to the olfactory sense.



If you have had such an experience don't let it worry you in the future, for under the postal laws and regulations it is a comparatively easy matter for you to get the letter back into your own hands

All you have to do is to go to your local postmaster and explain to him that you want to withdraw your letter from the mails. The postmaster must comply with your request, providing you can furnish proofs that you are the sender of the missive. These proofs consist of giving an accurate description of the letter you wish to get back as well as presenting to the postmuster a sample of your handwriting, which must be identical with that on the original letter.

The rules of the Postoffice department also permit postmasters to telegraph to the rallway mail clerk and get him to take a recalled letter out of a mall pouch after it has left the city on the way to its destination. This measure to secure the return of a letter is only taken, however, in extreme

## MINES AND RAILS LEAD DEVELOPMENT

Co-operation of S. P. With Mines Increases Business and Population

The vast, wealth-laden territory west of the Rocky Mountains owes its development primarily to two agencies-Mining and Railroading.

The attention of the world was first attracted to the West with the aunouncement of the discovery of gold. A great influx of people followed and the tales of the resources and possibilities in the West spread to all parts of the globe.

The one great obstacle in the way of development was the lack of transportation facilities. The long, perilous voyage around Cape Horn in 'windjammers" mitigated against any considerable interchange of commerce.

Fortunately there were captains of industry and finance possessed of broad vision, courage and sufficient faith in the future of the West to conceive and bring to completion great systems of transcontinental railways. Among these the Southern Pacific vere the first lines.

For many years there were nothing but main lines of railroads through the mining territory and the ores and rich minerals were transported to the railways by mules, donkeys and horses from mines far back in the mountains. The placer mining camps of the early days were about the only ones located adjacent to the railroad.

In the last twenty-five years the creater mining development on the Southern Pacific has been in Nevada and in Arizona and New Mexico, Operations in these districts have resulted in very heavy movements of mining supplies such as concentrating, smelting and other treating machinery, explosives, timbers and fuel,

There also has developed a very neavy outbound tonnage of bullion and other finished or semi-completed mineral products from the mines.

S. P. Co-Operates

The policy of the Southern Pacific always has been to co-operate in the development of these properties. In doing so it has followed the plan of publishing reasonable freight rates on the materials and supplies used in the mines and in the treatment of the products of the mines, with low rates on the ores or on the manufactured products out of the smelters.

In the adjustment of rates on the products of the mines it has been the policy to establish schedules based upon the values of the product. The principle has been recognized that a roducer of ore worth \$100 a ton can afford to pay a higher charge than can the producer of ore valued at \$20.

This has been done in recognition of the fact that the great bulk of the ores transported would be of lesser value and with the view of encouraging the greatest possible production of low grade ores, so that in the aggre gate would be transported sufficient volume of tonnage to afford a reasonable return on the investment.

The company also has encouraged to the fullest extent the treatment of minerals at the point of produc-

These policies have resulted in the maintenance of the closest possible feeling of co-operation between mine owners and the railroad, bringing about constantly increasing popula tion in the mountain and desert regions, with development in the thriving industrial cities, where only a few years ago there was nothing but struggling mining camps,

Twenty-five years ago both mining and railroad development in Arizona were in their infancy. Then the assessed value of all railroads operating within the state was less than \$3,000,-000, while the assessed value of min ing property of all description was less than \$2,000,000.

Assessed Valuations

The assessed valuations in 1921 forcefully show how the railroads and the mines constantly have progressed in the pioneering work of develop-

The assessed valuation of the rallreads of Arizona for this later year amounted to more than \$101,000,000 while that of the mining properties was more than \$407,000,000.

This enormous increase in the mining development in Arizona, from a comparatively insignificant copper producer twenty-five years ago to the greatest copper producing section of the United States today, has been due to a marked degree to the rail road development.

It is considered highly significant that some of the greatest copper pro ducing sections of the state actually have been developed only after the railroads were built into those terri

One example of this was in the con struction of what now is the Arizona Eastern Railroad, a line 124 miles long, into Globe, for one large mine As a result, the extensive low grade properties in the vicinity of Miami were developed. The mines at Ray were developed in a similar manner, following construction of a branch line railroad to Winkelman.

Mining experts declare it is a great question as to whether the low grade bodies in the vicinity of Minmi and Ray ever would have been developed it not been for the fact that branch railroad lines previously had been constructed to serve other terri-

#### ADDITIONS TO FRUIT SUFPLY

Bellef That Central and South American Products Might Be Grown in This Country.

Green olives, gropefruit, tomotoes, the banana-these were once practically unknown to Americans, whose taste for them had slowly to be cultivated.

"In "Food Products From Afer," E. H. S. and H. S. Bailey suggest that reveral other truits from Central and South America may yet become well krown. One is the white sprone which has a sour-bitter flavor, like grapefruit, but a smooth, custard-like texture, and is enthusiastically liked by many northern visitors. Experiments hellcate that Florida and California can produce it. The chayote is incaessely liked in South America and the West Indies, while in Drazil the grape-like fruit of the jaboticaba tree is a fa-

But it would appear that Americans miss more in not knowing the Brazilian custard-upple or sugar-apple than any thing else. "It occurs in creamy flakes," say the authors, "which seem to separate into segments. When eaten, it melts in the mouth and carries the flavor both of the ptneupple and the banana. Some verlettes have a flavor auggesting clotted cream with sugar, and the mlor of rose-water."

He failed to devise any way of carrying out his policy of fulfilling the reparations agreement and last summer he virtually abandoned it, adopting a new slogan of "bread first, then reparations. The united Socialists had been growing more and more restive and dissatisfied with the government's attitude relative to financial and economic problems, especially the grain requisition bill, and with its failure to curb speculation in the dollar and check the collapse of the mark,

So FAR as reparations go, the new cabinet has a program already formed, contained in the recent note to the reparations commission. This received the approval of the Socialists, the Democrats and the People's party. In this note the government expressed its willingness to fulfill the program for payment of reparations in kind and the stabilization of the mark on condition that it be granted a moratorium of from three to four years and that a finance syndicate be established as recommended by the international experts to restore Germany's credit. The note says the reichsbank will make a loan of 500,-000,000 gold marks (\$125,000,000) to the German government if allied bankers will furnish an equal sum. This money will be used to stabilize the mark. Germany says it will make an internal gold loan, but it asks that in order to facilitate the nation's ability to pay it be given the same rights of trade as specified in favored nations treaties.

This despite the fact that both the Conservatives and the Georgian Liberals directed a strong campaign against the Laborite candidates. The four leaders of the chief parties, Bonar Law, Lloyd George, Herbert Asquith and John R. Clynes, chief of the Labor party, all were elected to the house. The prime minister's plurality was rather slender, and so was Asquith's. Lloyd George's group of Liberals in the house will not be large but may serve him in the making of opposition combinations.

ONE of the most important decisions handed down recently by the Supreme Court of the United States was that read by Associate Justice Sutherland last week denying to the Japanese the right to be naturalized in the United States and to become citizens of this country. One case from Hawati and two from the state of Washington were decided together. The court held that the naturalization act of June 29, 1906, was limited by the provision of section 2, 169 of the revised statutes, authorizing the naturalization of "free white persons" and those of African birth and descent, and that the Japanese are not eligible to naturalization,

It was added in the decision that "there is not implied-either in the legislation or in our interpretation of it-any suggestion of individual unworthiness or racial inferiority. These considerations are in no manner involved."

NOT in many years before has South America experienced so severe an earthquake as that which devastated large sections of Chile. The most destructive of the tremors lasted but a few seconds, but the shocks recurred during several days, each one adding to the destruction and to the terror of the inhabitants. The worst results were on and near the coast, and great tidal waves increased the devastation. A number of towns and villages were wholly or partly razed, and the loss of life may reach 1,500 or 2,000. The American Red Cross responded immediately to the call for aid, and in addition President Harding ordered two vessels to take cargoes of food, clothing and medical supplies from the Canal Zone to the stricken region. Thousands of families are homeless and destitute, and already pestilence has broken out among them.

This disaster gives sharp point to the annual roll call of the American Red Cross, now in progress. The organization is always ready to meet such emergencies, but they make sudden and enormous demands on its financial resources. For that reason every American is urged to buy a yearly membership.

SO-CALLED Progressive Republicans who are members of the present congress or who were elected members of the Sixty-eighth congress, together with other prominent members of that wing of the party are said to be arranging a conference at which they will plan for open revolt against the leadership of President Harding and dictation of the "conservatives." #### WESTERN

Eighty-two dead was believed to be he death toll of the sinking of a Mexlcan freight and passenger steamer in the Gulf of California at La Bomba, a Mexican port at the junction of the Colorado river and the gulf, thirtyfive miles south of Calexico, Calif.

With seventy-five delegates from all parts of the Rocky Mountain region and the Pacific in attendance, the Northwest mining section of the National Safety Council has just closed at Butte. Speakers emphasized the statement that metal mining was the least dangerous of all the hazardous industries, pointing out that of the 80,000 accidental deaths in the United States last year, only 20,000 were attributable to industry, of these only a small fraction occurred in mining,

#### WASHINGTON

The United States Supreme Court has held that Liberty bonds held by national banks are taxable by the states for state purposes. An appeal brought by the Peoples bank of Kingfisher, Okin., from a lower court decision that national banks are not entitled to deduct from their capital, surplus and undivided profits in paying state taxes, money invested in Liberty bonds and other forms of taxexempt securities, was dismissed by the Supreme Court on the authorities cited.

A plot to smuggle ammunition into Fortress Monroe, Fort Storey and Camp Eustis was unearthed recently at Norfolk, Va., by postal inspectors. Large boxes of rifle catriridges were found in mail cars bound for each place. United States agents are puzzled. One man is held for questioning. Shipments were made from a house in Norfolk.

The star of woman suffrage reached its highest ascendency in American history when Mrs. W. H. Felton, the "grand old lady of Georgia," won her fight for a seat for a day as the first woman senator. Mrs. Felton won her senatorship when chivalry triumphed over legality. A single objection from any one of the ninety-five male senators would have prevented her taking her seat.

Frankly recognizing at the outset the formidable opposition to the administration's ship program, President Harding went in person before a joint session of Congress and sought, by the sheer force of business logic and patriotic appeal, to impress upon the nation's inwmakers the urgent need for enacting the Harding-Lusker ship subsldy bill without further delay.





345 MEN ARE SAVED BY QUICK WORK OF RESCUE

### EXPLOSION KILLS

DUMP TRAIN SEVERS WIRES AND SPARK FIRES FATAL GAS.

Birmingham, Ala. - Eighty were

killed and sixty injured, some of them seriously, in a dust explosion in Dolomite mine No. 3 of the Woodward Iron Company, nine miles from this city, which trapped 475 workers beneath the surface, according to an official statement issued here by D. E. Wilson, president of the company. Officials summed up the result of the disaster as follows: Dead, 83; injured, 60; men rescued uninjured, 345. General Crop Conditions.

Denver.-Recent snows and rain. have broken the long drought throughout much of the Rocky Mountain region according to reports of the U. S. Division of Crop and Live Stock Estimates and although late in the season will tend to benefit the outlook for fail grain. The heavy snow is delaying the harvesting of potatoes and sugar beets in some sections and soms frost damage is reported. Live stock are generally in good condition with the exception of New Mexico, and the supply of stock water is improved. The shortage of feed in some sections is causing heavy marketing. Considerable complaint of the shortage of cars is reported.

The outlook for fall sown grains has Improved in Utah and Nevada due to recent heavy precipitation, but is still poor. The supply of moisture is still deficient in the western half of Nevada. All small gain crops have germinated well in Arizona. Some sections in Colorado have received sufficient moisture, but probably too late to benefit fall plowing or fall sown. grains to any great extent.

The yield of potatoes in Colorado has been cut by the long drought. The quality is generally quite good although some dry rot is reported. Some damage by frost to potatoes in temporary storage is reported. The cold weather and Leavy precipitation has hindered harvesting in Utah. Digging of half the crop in northern Arizona is being delayed by snow.

Ward and associates by a Ka syndicate, will revert to its formur owners under a foreclosure order issued here by Justice Morrison. 

#### TOOTH DECAY DUE TO BREAD

Exhaustive Experiments Have Absolved Swests From Blame Which Has Been Attached to Them.

The general belief that the consumption of jams, jellies and such sweets are responsible for the progress of decay in our teeth, has not been borne out by experiments which were made at the hygicale institute of the Leipsic university. On the other hand it was indicated that bread was responsible for such troubles. This was shown by taking perfectly sound teeth and coating them with wax, into which an aperture was made at one point or another, and these were then subjected to an immersion in a mixture of bread and sallya at a temperature of 37 degrees Centigrade. At the end of 33 days many of the teeth showed signs of softening at the exposed points; while 23 days later all showed the softening signs. At the end of 124 days completely developed carles w53 developed in all the teeth under experiment. A similar test with Jams and tellies resulted in a complete vindication of the sweets, for the same teneth of time showed that the fruit acids and the perfumed acids of the prewhatever.

Right Way to Breathe.

The fundamental of health-also of beauty-is proper breathing. Most people don't bring the remote cells of the lungs into use. Paper the Greatest Invention. 
