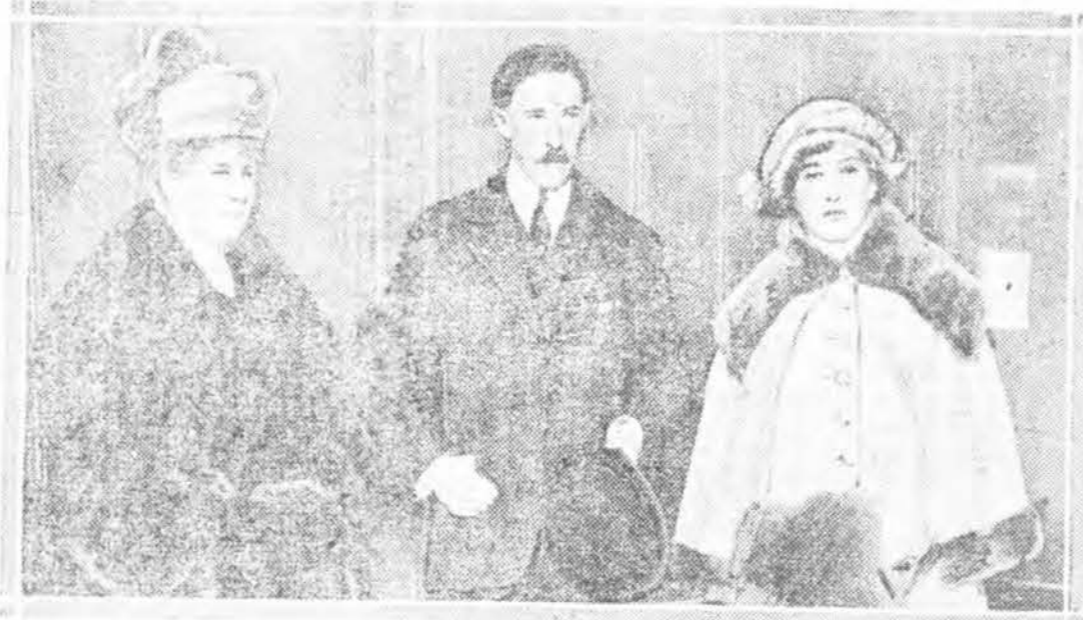

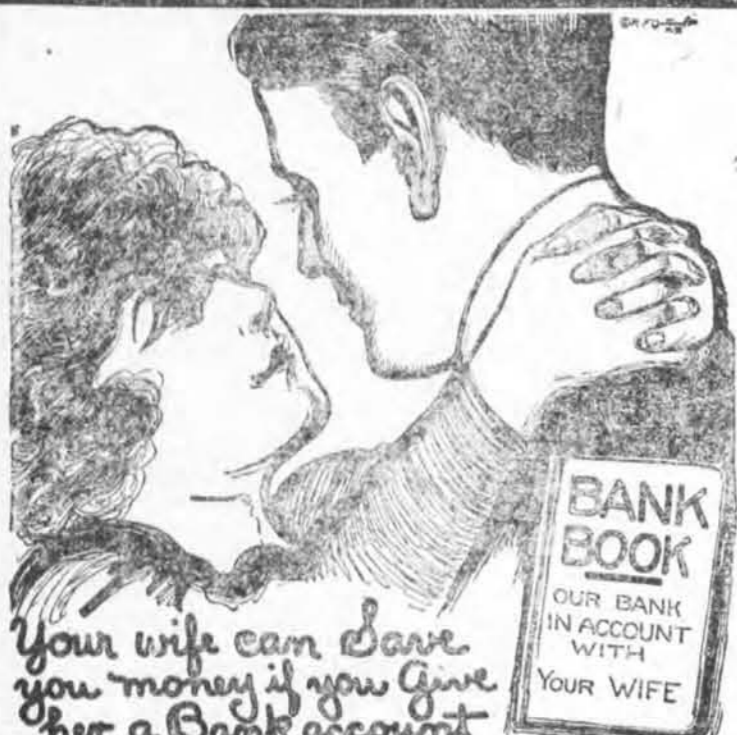

BANDITS GET ARMED MEN VESSEL "LEON" WRECKED BY EXPLOSION IN HARBOR

CHICAGO, Jan. 5—John Soffel, president of the Maywood State Bank, was killed; Louis Sweeney, suburb police chief, and Arthur Benson, bank messenger, were wounded when five bandits robbed them today of the \$12,000 payroll for the Maywood plant of the American Can company.

DUBLIN, Jan. 5—A. B. Kay, London Times correspondent, was kidnapped today by armed men, and his release demanded in the Dail. Michael Collins has sent men to Cork to the rescue. He declares that the kidnapers will be punished.

ATHENS, Jan. 5—Fifty bodies were recovered today from the Greek destroyer "Leon," which was wrecked by an explosion of a torpedo in Piraeus harbor. Warships nearby were damaged and houses ashore were wrecked, killing inhabitants.

DOUGLAS BREWERY IS SOLD TO MEXICO FIRM

DOUGLAS, Jan. 5—The People's Ice plant, formerly the Copper City brewery, has been sold to a Mexican firm represented by Eduardo Campbell and work has started to tear it down.

The machinery and what other equipment can be used will be sent to Colima, Mexico, where it will be reassembled and ice made to back the ice trust on the west coast. Several other old plants have or will be purchased by the firm, Campbell said.

In speaking of the Monterey Brewing company, the firm which he represents, Campbell said that this company now operates the largest brewery in the world. Every day 6000 cases and 8000 barrels of beer are turned out, the brewery being operated three eight-hour shifts out of each 24. Since prohibition went into effect in the country the brewery has tripled its capacity, he said, both the United States and Havana being supplied.

DUBLIN, Jan. 5—A message from Cork to Desmond Fitzgerald, minister of propaganda, announces that A. B. Kay, kidnapped correspondent of the London Times, might be released shortly.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5—Ex-sergeant Charles O. Neef, luckless doughboy who tried to capture Grover Bergdoll in Germany, believes in advertising. Newspapers all over the country published last week stories of his unfortunate plight.

He was hungry but there was much more interest in his German police dog than there was in him, the stories said. Within two days he had received 50 offers of jobs from almost as many states.

PRINCELY SALARIES IN MOVIE CASES OF HIGH THEATER PRICES

NEW YORK, Jan. 5—Salaries paid to motion picture stars are too high and must come down, President Brandt of the theater-owners' chamber of commerce, declared today.

Mr. Brandt said practically every other element of the cost of movies had been reduced and that the actors and actresses must economize themselves to salary cuts if the cost of the finished product were to be lowered enough to be reflected in admission prices.

He cited stars, who, he said, received as much as \$20,000 for a single picture and made as many as four or five a year.

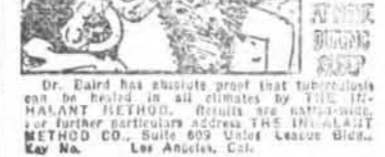
