Jazz Is International Medium Of Diplomacy

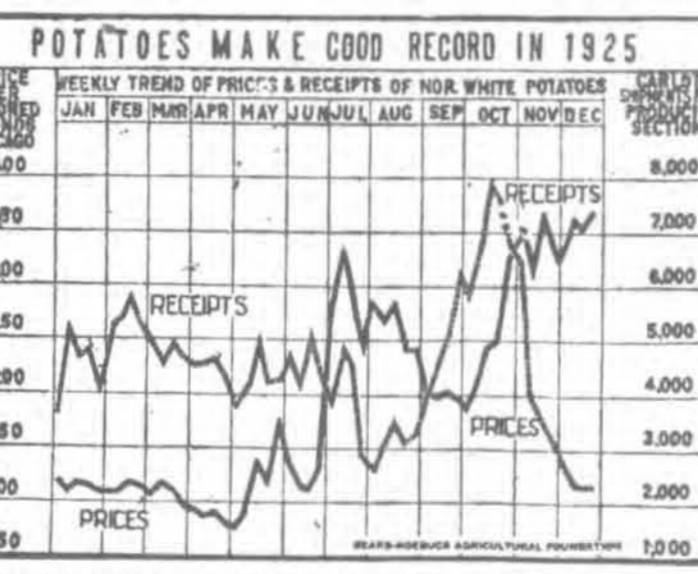

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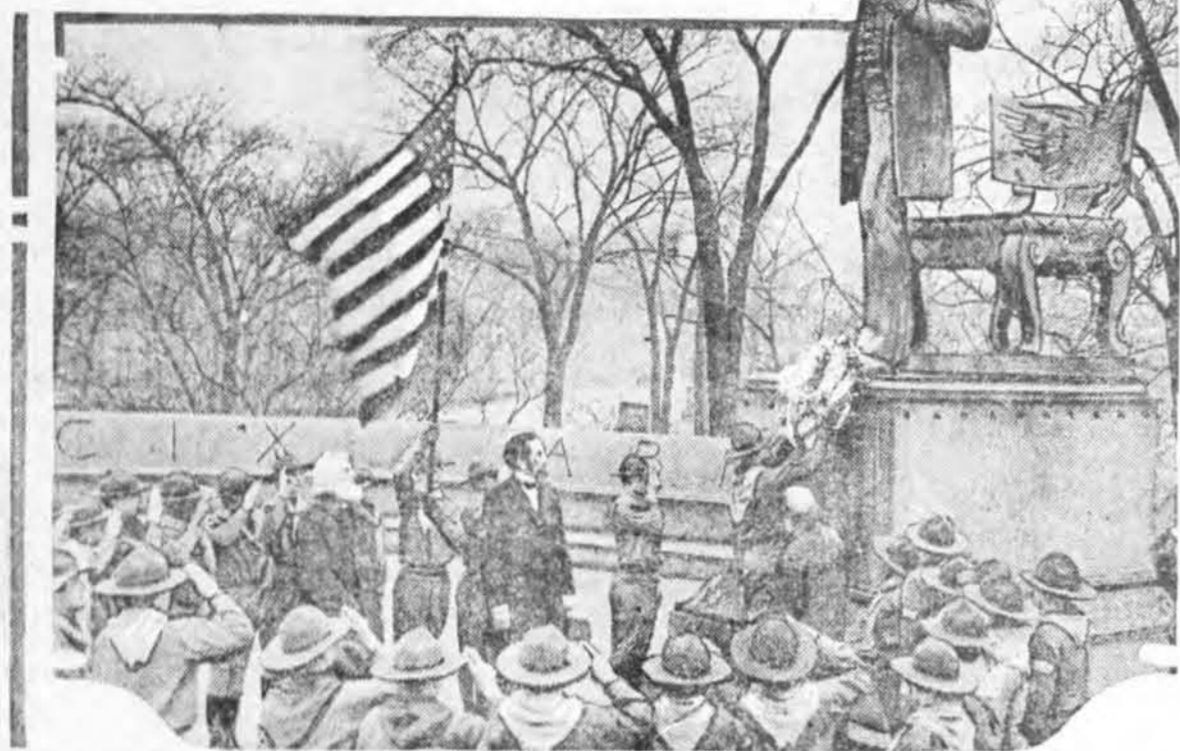

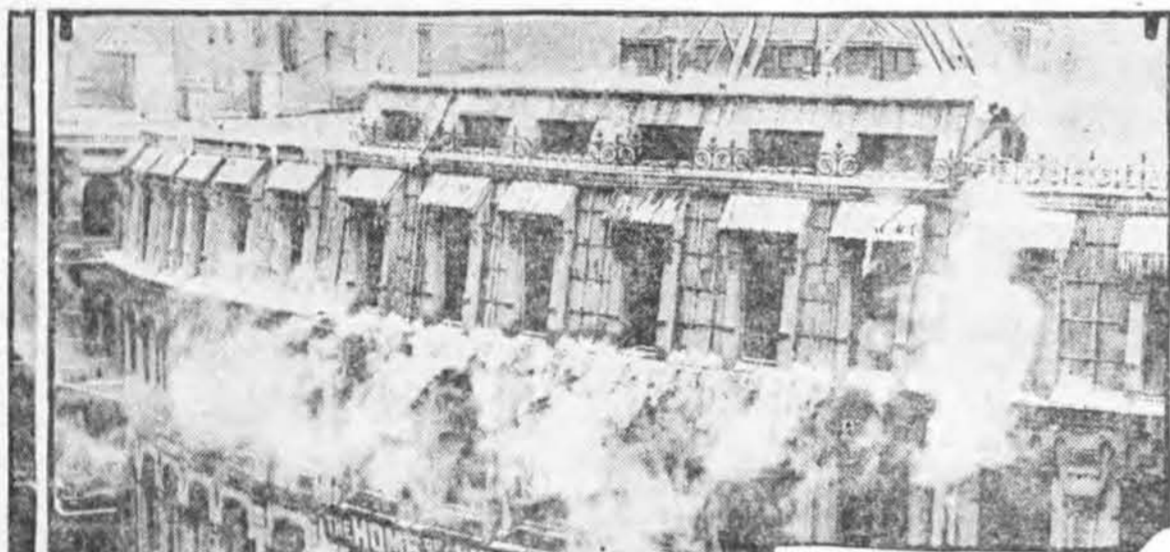

COAL AND OTHER MINERALS IN GALLUP-ZUNI BASIN, N. M.

The coal deposits and other mineral resources of the Gallup-Zuni Basin, in New Mexico, are the subject of a geologic report just issued by the department of the interior as Bulletin 767 of the geological survey, by J. D. Sears. This basin, which lies in McKinley and Valencia counties, has great economic value as well as geologic interest. Its commercial importance is at present centered in the Gallup coal district, the natural wealth of the rest of the basin having been almost untouched. The Gallup district, in which active mining has been carried on for nearly half a century, is now the second largest producing district in the state, and owing to the adaptability of the coal to certain uses, the convenient shipping facilities, and the nearness of the coal beds to the mining camps of Arizona it is one of the most important coal-mining districts in the southwest.

The Gallup-Zuni report describes the geology and mineral resources of the whole basin in a general way, and the coal beds of the Gallup district and the Zuni Indian reservation in greater detail. It is well illustrated with photographs, diagrams and maps.

ARIZONA HAS NEW CHAMPION DAIRY COW

Cheesey Farm of Glendale, Ariz., has captured another state dairy championship through the performance of Silverine's Golden Maid, a 5-year-old Jersey cow, which has completed a 305-day test with a record of 479.62 pounds of butter fat and 8727 pounds of milk.

Cheesey Farm now holds four state Jersey championships in the 305-day division. Some championships over all breeds are also held by individuals of the Cheesey Farm herd.

The sire of the new champion is Silverine of Cheesey Farm, and her dam is Queenie of Cheesey Farm.

WHO GETS TAX REDUCTION?

The bills that are being put through congress to lop off millions of federal taxes will benefit the great mass of taxpayers, including the large taxpayer, the small taxpayer and the non-taxpayer.

Tax reduction is inevitably a great stimulant to industry, to investment and to the inauguration of new enterprises, because it means a lowering of production costs.

It is a fact that cost of production is almost inevitably passed on to the consumer, as much as raw material and labor costs, only the item of taxation is a permanent one liable to be increased by state and local authorities.

It is not easily controverted that the sale price of an article, which must be the total cost of production plus a profit and all cost of operation, is finally taxed upon the consumer. And so it comes about that all are benefited by tax reduction.

THE VANISHING ICEMAN

Within the last year electric refrigeration has rapidly acquired a widespread importance through the linking up of cooperative effort between refrigeration manufacturers and electric power companies.

The great advantages of household electric refrigeration are, its automatic and steady operation, its ability to maintain a lower temperature of dry cold with entire absence of moisture, drip and dirt, and its better conditioning of refrigerated food.

Parallel with household refrigeration has developed iceless storage of ice cream for confectionary stores, soda fountains and restaurants. The prospects for electric refrigeration extend even further and include the florist and fine fruit-trade, milk cooling, as well as certain processes of food manufacture.

Considering only the household market for electric refrigeration, the possibilities for this growing industry are enormous. Less than 1 per cent of the market has been sold, although unit sales have doubled each year for the last five years. With over 12,000,

600 homes wired for electricity, the number of household electric refrigerators is expected to soon reach the washing machine figure which is nearly 4,000,000.

It is estimated that the iceless refrigeration units which will be manufactured this year will require almost 30,000,000 pounds of copper.
