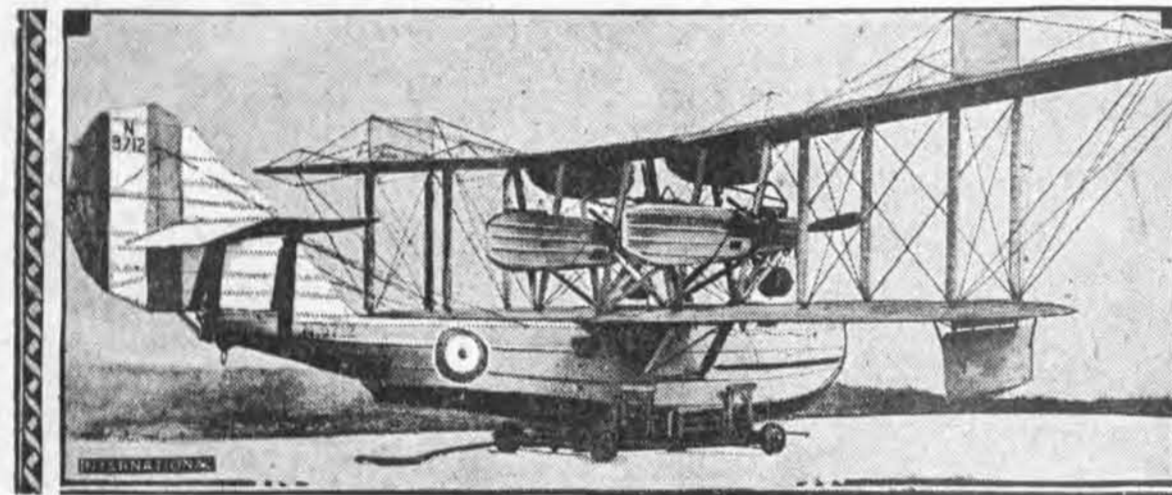


"Typographical Terrace" Is Formally Opened

Few authors have had their works studied so minutely as Carlyle, and his ease and fluency in writing have been seized upon by many as examples of the sort of literature which always will endure.

Much time was spent on his "History of Friedrich the II of Prussia," called "Frederick the Great," and this production of his pen also was the largest the eminent author turned out. The last two volumes appeared in 1865, and although he continued to some extent in his field, this work in reality marked the end of a successful career.

While in Scotland Carlyle received word of the death in London of his wife, accounting for much of his later seclusion. In his later life he was offered a government pension and a baronetcy, both of which he declined. He died at Chelsea, February 5, 1881.

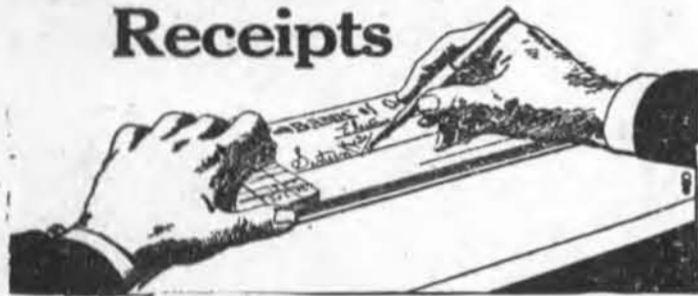

Rank Health With Three "R's" Is Plea

As an educational subject for children, health should hold equal rank with the three "R's" in the curriculum of public schools. Doctors declare that without a healthy, sturdy body it is impossible for the child to have a healthy, happy mind.
Neglect of childhood defects may result in permanent physical impairment later on. Many childhood ills are traceable directly to malnutrition.
High school students especially need a variety in foods for at this age their growth is rapid. The protein or "building food" should be abundant for high school boys and girls. When they buy their luncheons, high school pupils are apt to display a preference for chocolate sodas, cream puffs and candy. An appetizing luncheon put up at home is much to be preferred to the sort the boy or girl might obtain at the corner store near the school.
Meat is all right for the school luncheon but it should be put up in tempting form. If sliced thin it is more appetizing in sandwiches than if in thick pieces. Beverages or soup may be carried in thermos bottles but the bottles must be carefully washed and aired daily after using.
Milk is recommended for an important place in the boy's or girl's diet because of its proteins, minerals, phosphorus and calcium, necessary for the development of the body and in the case of calcium and phosphorus for the building of bone and teeth. Evaporated milk has come into favor as a health builder for children as well as adults because by removal of 60 per cent of the water it is rendered more than twice as rich in food value as ordinary milk and by a process called homogenizing more digestible than bottled market milk.
Crisp lettuce and celery, carefully washed and dried, may be so wrapped in oil paper that they will be fresh and in good condition at lunch time. Lettuce should not be used in sandwiches for wilted lettuce is almost inedible.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF N. M. GIVES CREDIT TO C. M. T. C. STUDENTS

Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Jan. 28.—The New Mexico State Board of Education, after careful consideration of the resulting benefits, has authorized one-third unit of credit for 30 days' attendance at a Citizens' Military Training Camp, to students in school that require in excess of 15 fixed units for graduation.

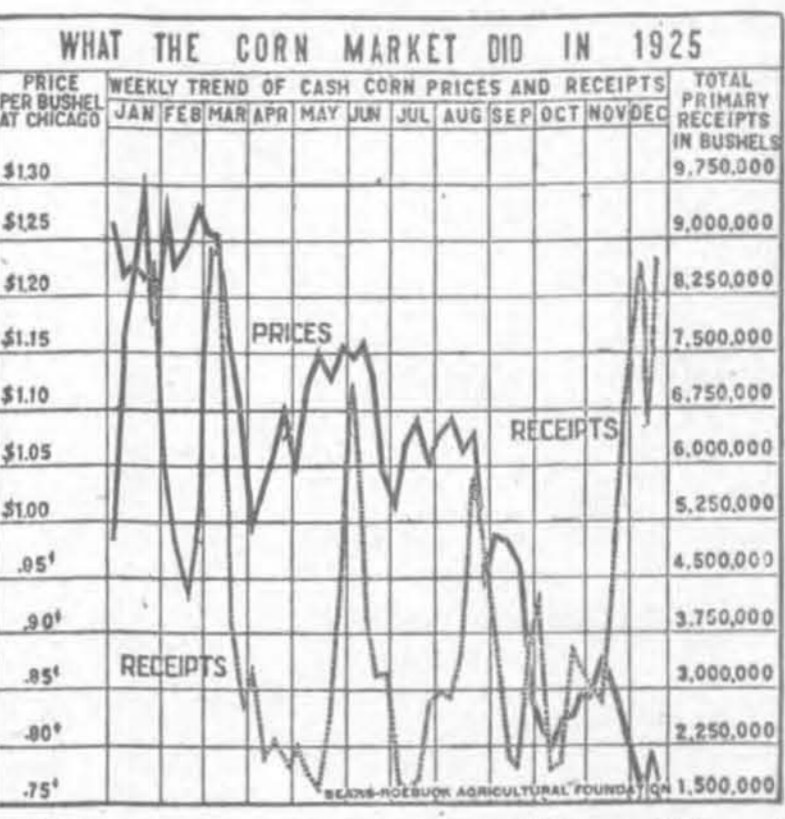

TWENTY per cent more corn was produced in 1925 than in 1924, according to the corn survey of the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. An increased production of 587,836,000 bushels brings the 1925 figure to 2,909,581,600 bushels. This, plus the carry-over of 1924, makes the general marketable 1925 corn crop of 2,901,581,000 bushels the largest in five years. While the corn crop was nearly a failure in the Southwest and the average yield was low in almost the entire cotton belt, the corn belt itself, in practically all sections north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers, produced an excellent crop of fine quality.
The large excess production, however, and the fact that there is fewer live stock on the farms and some curtailment in feeding operations, have made corn plentiful and low in price. Prices dropped steadily from the top price in January of \$1.32 to 82 cents in November in Chicago. Receipts fluctuated violently with an up-turn grade beginning in October.
The United States is the corn nation of the world, producing 70 per cent of the entire crop. New uses for corn promise to increase consumption of this grain appreciably. Particularly significant is the manufacture of corn sugar, which is increasing in commercial importance.
