Nothing is more important to the prosperity and advancement of the west than the operation of its mines. **ONE MAN'S GOOD TURN**

**PREPAREDNESS**

The complexity of the problem of national defense is quite baffling to the mind of the layman, otherwise the taxpayer. But the experts evidently know all about it; at least we can only hope so.

**PENITENTIARY GOES BROKE**

The Louisiana state penitentiary is bankrupt, busted, broke. It is said that it may have to go out of business for lack of funds. This sounds like a joke, but it isn't.

Harry C. Pitcher, manager of the institution, declares that for several months the penitentiary has been unable to meet its bills, and its credit is practically exhausted.

This condition has been brought about through a provision in the appropriation bill for the prison's maintenance which requires that funds to meet its expenses must be provided from its earnings. An increase in the number of inmates, poor crop conditions, low sugar prices and flood losses are said to have conspired to put the penitentiary into virtual bankruptcy.

Unless the legislature shall authorize the borrowing of about half a million dollars until the present year's crops can be harvested and marketed, it appears that the inmates must be turned loose.

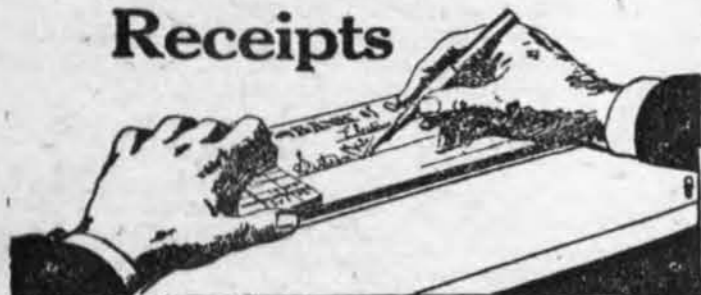

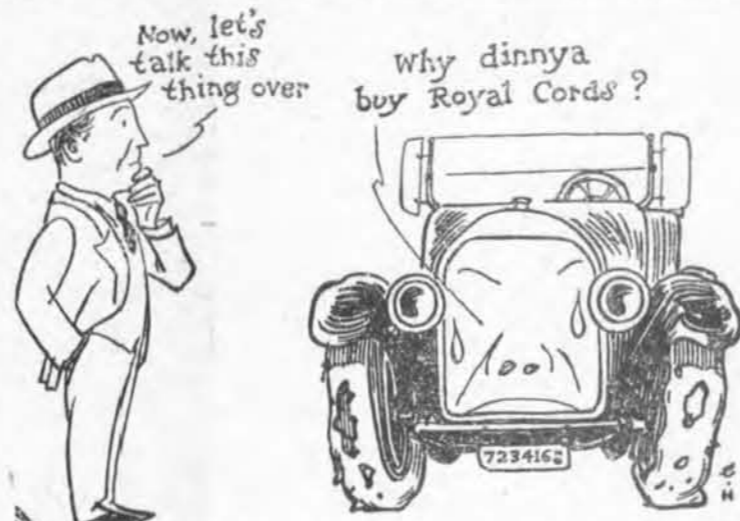

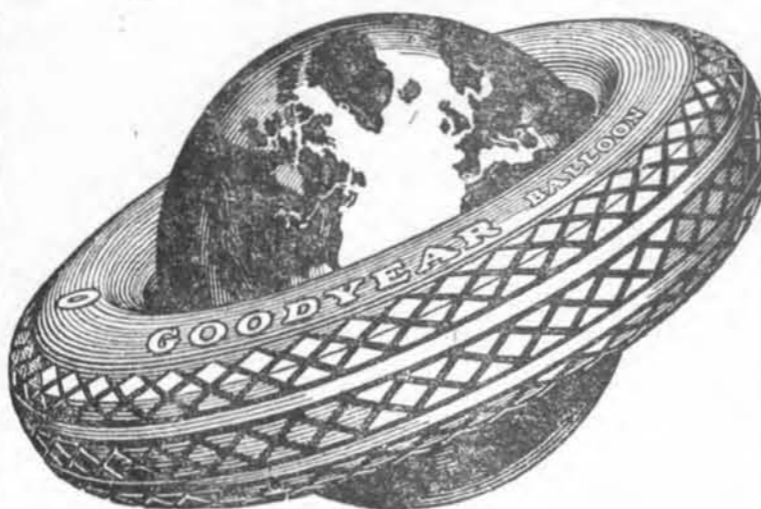

### 100 HUNTERS REGISTER FOR BIG BUFFALO HUNT

Phoenix, July 14.—Since State Game Warden D. E. Pettis announced a week ago the details of the buffalo hunt to be held next December under the auspices of the state game department in House Rock Valley, nearly 100 holders of 1927 Arizona fishing and hunting licenses have registered their names with the department.

Out of the names thus submitted and those to be sent in between the present time and next November, 15 will be drawn during state fair week. Those whose names are drawn will be the fortunate hunters.

Fifteen of the oldest and largest buffalo in the recently purchased state herd are to be taken by the hunters. These buffalo are outlaws from the main herd, but as trophies they are the best specimens in the herd of 80 head.

Any holder of a 1927 Arizona fishing and hunting license, resident or non-resident, may send to State Game Warden D. E. Pettis State House, Phoenix, his name, address, license number and the name of the license deputy signed on the license, and thus be assured that he will have an equal chance with others to have his name drawn during state fair week, when the drawing is to take place.

Cherbourg, France, July 12.—Commander Richard E. Byrd and his three companions, Lieutenants Norville and Belchan and Bert Acosta, who flew over the Atlantic with him less than two weeks ago, sailed for home at sundown this evening aboard the Leviathan. They were weary from the many days and nights of entertainment, but very happy to be on their way back to the land to whose glory they have added much.

Also aboard the Leviathan was

Clarence D. Chamberlain, who made the trans-Atlantic flight to Germany ahead of them in the Columbia. Having gathered his European laurels long before Byrd and his companions arrived in France, Chamberlain went aboard as an ordinary passenger might and gracefully retired into the background, leaving Byrd and his men alone to receive the official farewells of France and the plaudits of their fellow passengers.

"Au revoir and viva la France," was Byrd's farewell as he left the continent. "We are delighted beyond measure that we landed the America on

Melting Bullet Made, Aid Crime War  
 Composed of glycerin, stearin and an antiseptic compound, a "deathless" bullet, devised by an eastern inventor, is intended to wound a person without killing him, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. It melts after entering the body, leaving a clean wound, but has force enough to stop a man at 20 feet, and would be fatal if striking a vital spot. A feature of the bullet is that it makes twice as much noise as an ordinary one when fired, so it would be of aid to a citizen in spreading an alarm. Tests showed that it penetrated a one-inch pine board, and it was also shot into him to demonstrate its properties.

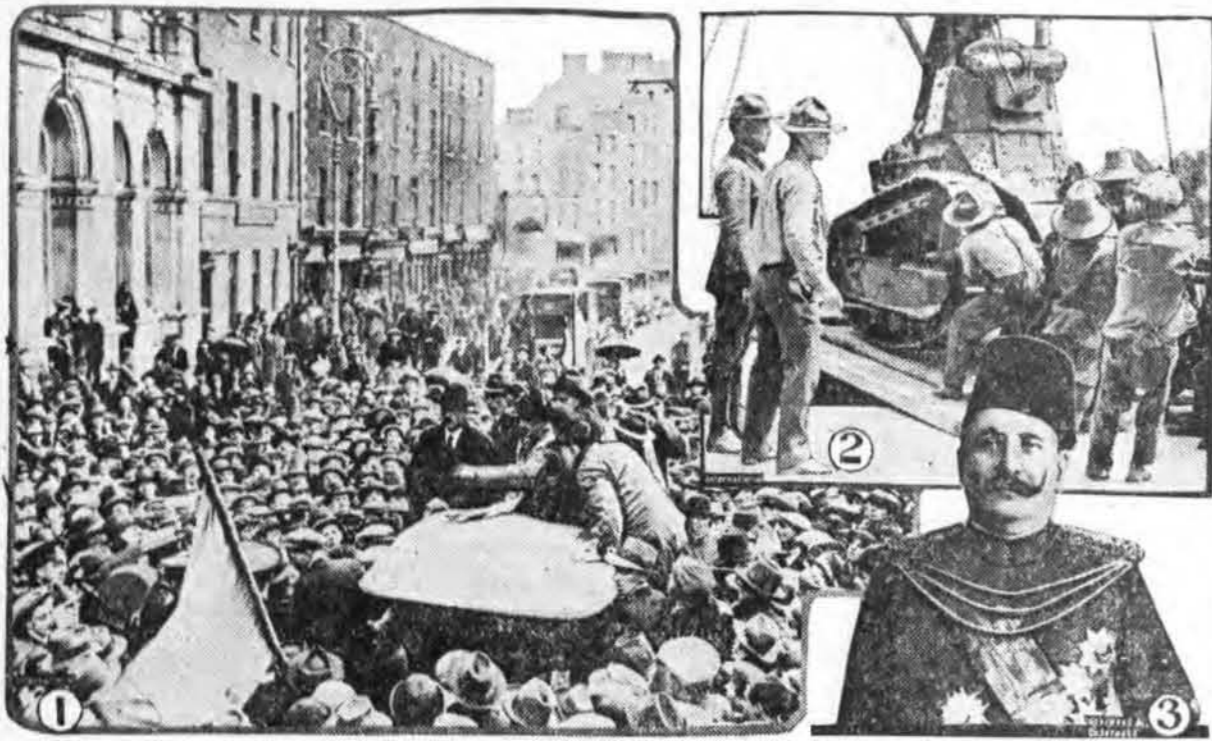

### NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

#### United States and Japan Oppose British Cruiser Demands.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD  
BRITANNIA rules the waves, and she intends to go on ruling them, if the efforts and arguments of her representatives at the Geneva naval limitation conference are a true indication of the national spirit. Last week the conference devoted themselves to the subject of cruisers, earnestly discussing the conclusions reached by the naval experts and, at this writing, having reached nothing like an agreement. As was explained a week ago, the British demanded a minimum of 600,000 tons of cruisers, most of them preferably below 7,500 tons each, on the ground that their world-wide commerce lanes and their need of protecting the home food supply required this, and evidently because their innumerable naval bases would enable the vessels of restricted cruising radius to operate anywhere. America wanted the limit put at 250,000 tons and said the United States needed vessels of 10,000 tonnage, not having adequate bases abroad. Her delegates, however, in the effort to make the conference a success, offered tentatively to make the maximum limit 400,000 tons.

classes—coast defense craft of about 600 tons and fleet submarines capable of going to sea with a combat squadron approximating 1,600 tons, were abandoned. The experts decided merely to limit the size of the largest submarines and set 1,800 tons as the tentative maximum.  
China's voice was heard in the conference for the first time when Chao Hsin-chu, representative in the council of the League of Nations, made this announcement:  
"It is repeatedly reported in the press of the Far East that the naval conference may also consider questions relating to China. I therefore have been requested by the Chinese national government and the people to state that the republic will refuse to recognize any decision affecting China which may be arrived at by the present, or any other conference in which China is not represented, participating equally in the deliberations."  
PRESIDENT COOLIDGE had a lot of fun last week, mixed up with business. In the first place he celebrated his fifty-fifth birthday on the birthday of the nation, receiving innumerable messages of congratulation, eating a wonderful cake and receiving the mounted boy scout troop from Custer. The lads presented to the President a beautiful bay mare and a complete cowboy outfit of clothing, and he promptly donned the elaborate regalia. Next day, still wearing his cowboy hat, he attended the Tri-State Roundup at Bellefourche. Mrs. Coolidge accompanied him, and they enjoyed hugely the doings of the wild riders, Indians in war dress, cowboys and trick riders gathered from all parts of the West. The Chief Executive had ignored protests from organized sentimentalists against what they called the "commercialized cruelty" of the rodeo. Wednesday Mr. Coolidge put on his chaps and took a long ride on his new mare.  
Most important of the week's visitors at the summer White House was Ambassador Sheffield, who conferred with the President on the Mexican situation, reporting fully on conditions in the neighboring republic, and presumably also discussing the question of his resignation. He has been waiting for a year to give up his post and the time may be considered opportune. John J. Garrett of Maryland and Silas Strawn have been mentioned as successor to Mr. Sheffield.

COMMANDER BYRD and the other members of the crew of the transatlantic plane Amerigo were the recipients of many honors in Paris, and the commander was awarded the cross of the Legion of Honor. The aviators booked passage for return to the United States starting July 12. Byrd says he plans to lead a two-plane expedition to the Antarctic in the fall which will spend perhaps a year and a half in procuring information about the continent at the South pole. Clarence Chamberlin also planned immediate return to the United States by steamer, having declined to pilot the Columbia back, but Charles A. Levine said he was hunting for a French pilot who would bring him home on the big plane.  
GENERAL CHEN and a large part of his Chinese army went over to the Nationalists and as a result the southerners gained possession of most of Shantung province and at last reports were but a few miles from Tsingtao. The northern forces were still holding Tsinanfu, the capital, and a narrow strip north of the Yellow river. Conditions in Shantung were such that Japan decided to send two thousand more Japanese troops from Dalren to Tsingtao, and a hundred military railway men and telegraphers also were hurried into that region. This movement further enraged the Chinese against the Japanese and caused them to forget their animosity against the British.  
KING FUAD of Egypt, whose sovereignty was threatened recently by Great Britain, went to London on a state visit and was received with great pomp by King George, the royal family and the government. He was accompanied by Premier Sarwat Pasha, and the British foreign office undertook to work out with him a treaty which should settle the rela-

#### Many Inventors Had Idea of Phonograph

The first patent on the gramophone style of "talking machine" was granted to Emile Berliner 40 years ago.  
The first machine called a phonograph was a mechanical music player, invented by Feby, an Englishman, in 1832, designed to be attached to pianofortes and other keyed instruments.  
Machines with a similar object had been projected as early as 1747, but were failures. The discovery of the phenomena on which the modern talking machine is based was made by Thomas A. Edison in 1877—and while Edison was engaged on experiments to a totally different end, Edison's first machines were very crude, but they supplied the inspiration for Berliner and other inventors.  
About the time Berliner patented his first gramophone Edison again took up the invention, and after much study produced the phonograph substantially as we know it today.

#### Lost—a Train!

Some people are incredibly careless. The other day we heard of a man who mislaid an elephant; now we hear of some one who lost a railway train! Both these interesting items of lost property have been recovered.  
The elephant had merely gone for a stroll down a lonely lane, but the train had been stolen by Polish railway officials.
