CURBING A NUISANCE

For several years numerous individuals and firms have greatly annoyed citizens throughout the country by sending them articles of merchandise which had not been ordered "on approval" by mail.

Recipients of these unsolicited articles of merchandise, usually hosiery, neckties and other articles of no great value, have apparently accepted the stuff and paid for it in a large percentage of cases, thus encouraging the spread of the practice.

Senders of these goods have attempted to secure payment from unwilling customers by means of tracers sent through regular postal channels, thus apparently making the postoffice department a party to the scheme. This has been resented by the department, which now proposes legislation making these annoying practices an offense against the postal laws, a measure which will doubtless meet with general approval on the part of the public.

Until this nuisance shall be curbed by official action, intended victims might adopt measures of their own, similar to that employed by a certain physician, who received a \$2 package of socks which had not been ordered.

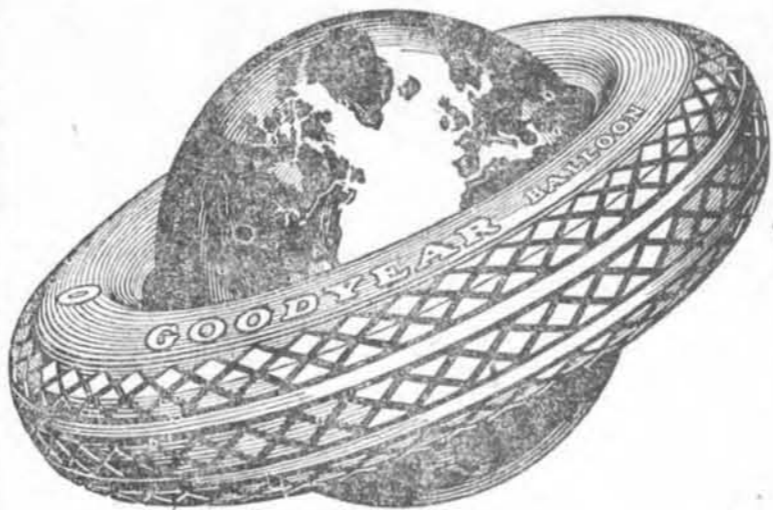

WALTER P. CHRYSLER'S TRAFFIC TALKS



CITY SHOULD HAVE TRAFFIC ENGINEER

Cities can get traffic relief by better use of existing roads, by more intelligent use of signal lights and by continuous up-to-date information on the flow of traffic as the basis for improvements. Such are the conclusions of the City Traffic Conference held in Chicago. Among the specific recommendations advanced by the Conference are the following:
Every city of 25,000 and more should have a traffic engineer.
Simplicity should be the keynote of a traffic code.
Timing of signal lights should be planned in detail by a competent engineer.
Shorter signal intervals will speed traffic.
Caution lights are often better

than "stop-go" signs where traffic is light.
Careful and complete check on use of streets must be made—where and when loads are carried, as shown by vehicular counts.
Pedestrian traffic is of major importance and must be considered in any traffic plan.
Night haulage by motor trucks can relieve traffic and are an economy for the shipper.
Two-thirds of a given traffic street can be used for downtown traffic in the morning and for uptown traffic at night.
Plan now for a city twice its present size and traffic.
Streets should be classified for different traffic use, such as express boulevards for passenger cars,
