ARIZONA FIRS. IN YIELD PER

in area of farm land and total value of farm production, Arizona ranked first in the entire United States in average yield per acre of eight crops last year, and first in average value per acre of five, according to preliminary estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture. State agricultural figures in the De-

cember supplement of "Crope and Markets," issued by the federal department, reveal that Arizona outranked all other states in its average production per acre of winter wheat, all wheat, alfalfa, tame hay, all hay, sweet potatoes and cantaloupes, and ranked second in cotton nd lettuce le average value per acre, it ranker first in oats, sweet potatoes and t different classifications of hay, second in wheat, barley and cotton

It is believed revised figures will give it first place in average acre value of cotton also, as the figures quoted are based on short staple prices and do not allow for th production of Pima long staple here, which brought much higher returns, and therefore would raise the average considerably.

The valuation figures given in the the estimates ae not intended to reprezent the actual value of crop production, but for comparative purposes are based on prices of the respestive products on December 1. They are highly interesting, however, as showing the higher returns that may be expected in Arizona as compared to the average for the rest of the coun

Lincoln had little or nothing to do with the case. It is true that he was concerned about the case and "simply as a matter of form" made the request to McClellan that Scott's life be spared. He let the fact of his request be known to impress upon the soldiers the seriousness of Scott's offense, for when the pardon was read before the regiment, the warning was uttered that nothing short of the President's request had saved this soldier and that the President was not likely to do it again.

The Seminole Indians of Florida have no government of any kind and no chief. Their laws seem to be embodied in one rule of conduct-never to lie. In the picturesque palmetto camps there are no doors, no police, no lying, no cheating, no stealing, no private property, but there is order. here is peace, there is respect and there is honor. Woman among the Seminoles occupies a high position. 


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"The Sun Do Move"

Good Tips for Home Gardener

Judicious Use of Manure and Fertilizer Is of Much Importance.

As he prepares his seed-bed for planting, the wise home gardener bears in mind that nothing is more important in making every foot of the garden yield its best than the judicious use of manure and fertilizer. classed as "coof" manures, and although the plant food is not as readily avaliable as in horse manure, it will give very good results. Ponitry and sheep manure are dubbed "hot" manures, and should be applied very cantiously, especially on the root or fruit crops,

When fresh manure is used, it should be plowed under to a depth of six to eight inches and entirely covered with earth. On the other hand, if the manure is well-rotted, only balf of it should be plowed under, and the other half broadcast and raked into the surface,

Commercial Fertilizers.

If you want the best nil-around fertilizer, get what is generally known as either the 4-8-4 or the 3-8-3. The term "4-8-4" simply means that the fertilizer contains 4 per cent ammonia, 8 per cent of phosphoric acid and 4 per cent of potash. Either nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia is used to give a larger leaf growth on those vegetables which produce edible leaves, such as lettuce, endive and parsley. Small applications of about one tenspoonful scattered around each plant of tomatoes, cabbage, eggplants, etc., or side-dressed celery, will give a better growth in stalk and better colored leaves.

Where Lime Comes In. Lime should never be used in direct contact with the manure, because It has a tendency to liberate the pitrogen faster than plants can use it. Practically all garden soils need time, however, and would be benefited by about ten pounds for each 100 square feet. Any finely pulverized lime is satisfactory for this. The right time to apply it is after the manure has been plowed under. Broadcast and rake it into the surface soil,

Green Feeds Essential for Health of Poultry

During the last cold spells of the eason many cases of leg weakness in hens that have been laying heavily are reported. These are usually traceable to the fact that the owner has run out of green food. Such foods contain what is technically known as viramines. When they are exhausted from the bird's body she begins to suffer. If green feed is given the bird will soon recover. Cabbage, sprouted grains or even steamed alfalfa leaves are beneficial.-C. C. Krum, Poultry Specialist, Colorado Agricultural College.

Keeping Silage From Freezing Is Easy

First Thing to Do Is to Keep Silo Tight.

Many farmers who have trouble with silage freezing blame the trouble on the type of silo, but careful observers believe that there is no noticeable difference among silos as to freezing and that the trouble is due largely to the way the silo and silage are managed. How can freezing be prevented?

First of all, the silo must be kept tight, so that the air above the sliage will not as a sort of insulation. The silo roof must be tight, the windows kept closed, the silo doors put back in place as the sllage is fed down, only one or two doors being left open at the top of the silage, and these openings must be kept closed with heavy blankets or rugs or sacks of straw which can be pulled into place when leaving the sile. A cover over the bottom of the chute will also help.

Then the silage must be handled properly. It should be kept higher in the center and should be broken loose from the wall down two or three Inches at the close of each feeding period. Two or three heavy rugs or blankets spread over the sliage, especially around the walls, will help i great deal in preventing freezing from one period to the next. Any small amount of frozen silage pulled loos from the wall should be put at the center of the silo and covered with : rag or curpet or tarpaulin, and the natural heat from the silage will usually thaw it our before the next feeding period. It should be remembered that the large body of shage has quite a lot of bent and that freezing from vere so long as this heat is kept from escaping upward.

Artificial Light and

Heat Good for Fowls

Artificial heat is the latest modern addition to poultry management that may prove successful. Authorities say practical poultrymen have kept up egg production during cold snaps by taking the chill off the air and preventing the drinking water from freezing.

Without lights the hens can only put in about half the time they have in the summer to consume feed. Artificial lighting methods have broken the long periods of Idleness from darkness to daylight. Given more working hours, the hen has responded with a larger egg production for the year. The increase is obtained during the winter season when eggs are least

An all-mash method of feeding poultry has been reported favorably. The dry feeds are all crushed or ground and mixed in proper proportions and fed in a hopper to which the heas

Well Grown Pullets Are

Winter egg production is largely obtained from the pullets that are well grown, properly fed and carrying produced eggs for one laying year normally rest during the winter and start laying in February and March, advises D. C. Henderson, extension poultry specialist at South Dakota state college,

Mr. Henderson advises keeping a flock consisting of two-thirds pulletand one-third bens. The pullets should be forced for winter egg production hens should be allowed to rest during the winter and kept for the production of hatching eggs next spring.

Dormant Spray for Cherries

Sour cherries will not often require a dormant sprny, but if needed the spray recommended for peaches may be used. The sprays are applied as follows, using lime-sulphur 134 to 50 or bordenux 3-4-50 plus one pound of arsenate of lead; Make the first spray just before the cherry trees bloom, the second when the shucks are drop ing from the young truit, and a third spray following the second in about two weeks. To control cherry leaf spot, about two additional sprays should be applied after harvest. The interval between them should be about three weeks.

New Japanese Pest Indications of an entirely new American post in New York and New Jersey have been received by the United States Department of Agriculthird search that has been introduced from Japan. It is suggested that entomologists be on the lookout for it. Unlike the other two species which have been introduced, it is not of striking appearance. It is a small, brown search which superficially resembles a number of the species of the genus Serien.

Secretary Kellogg States Administration Policy in China Mix-Up.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

MERICAN lives and property in A China will be protected by the government of the United States so long as the Chinese authorities fail to protect them, and Admiral Williams, in command of the naval forces sent there, has broad instructions to act either alone or in co-operation with the forces of other powers. Our government, however, feels sincere friendship for China and looks with sympathy on the efforts of the Chinese to reorganize their government, and is ready to negotiate new trentles with them as soon as conditions are right.

Such, briefly, is the administration's policy as set forth by Secretary of State Kellogg in a public statement which was cabled to China and other countries.

GOOD CARE COUNTS WITH HEN FLOCKS

Summarizing a year's reports of 31 Minnesota poultry record flocks in 19 countles, Corn E. Cooke, poultry specialist with the agricultural extension service, University of Minnesota, finds that one location is about as good as another in Minnesota for keeping poultry; that there is no one most profitable breed; that improved feeding more than pays for itself in increased returns; that good housing is essential to good returns, and that Minnesota farm flocks are an asset to the farm business.

Also the records seem to show that increased annual net returns can be expected from a high egg production, a low-feed cost, and the selling of poultry and eggs to advantage, especially

for breeding purposes. Six breeds are represented in the 31 flocks. The average number of eggs ald per hen was 128 and the average feed cost per hen for the year was \$1.95. The average net return per bird was \$2.53. In the ten flocks having the highest production, the actual feed cost was \$2.04 per hen as compared with a cost of \$1.86 in the ten owest producing flocks. Figured in terms of a dozen eggs, the high-producing flocks did the best with feed costs amounting to only 15.04 cents per dozen eggs, while it was 25 cents a dozen in the low producing flocks. The average was 18 cents a dozen. In other words, it costs more to produce more eggs, but the increased production brings a greater return.

Rooster Needs Special

Feeding and Management

Wintering Turkeys Not a Very Difficult Task





The 25 per cent which the state receives is computed on net receipts. Rio Arriba county leads with \$4,899.93 from its 412,332 cres of forest.
